We are not willing to fall into the belief

that it will be better, for each individual to keep up the streets and pavements in front of his property, or even contiguous to it. Without some well ordered, well managed and well superintended system, is adopted, there will be no uniformity of the work either of material or character, besides there is occasionaly a plat, the title to which is in litigation, and the owner could not be identified, so that here would be a difficulty. Then again, there never will be any satisfaction in regard to the streets or pavements, until an organized effort is made to improve them by a plan and material, uniform in quality. Under this plan a dozen men might improve the payement in front of their property, but for some cause the next man might fail, and we see at once that the pavement on a whole square would be of ittle use on account of this failure.

On the other hand, if a property owner pays three hundred dollars town taxes on a piece of property, it is manifestly unjust for the city fathers to take the money, and put it in the suburbs, or use it in tearing down a bridge which is a public benefit, where suburban property does not pay one-twentieth of that sum.

We would take this opportunity to inform our city fathers that all classes and conditions of our citizens are much exercised on the subject of the condition of the streets. After making every apology which can possibly be offered, on account of the bad weather, rain, etc., we must be allowed to say that the present condition of our streets is a disgrace to our city government Every traveler who visits us is struck with the ill condition of our avenues of trade, to say nothing of the streets in a more retired part of the city.

We opine that we are not "speaking out of-meeting," when we say that there is wide spread dissatisfaction with regard to the present city administration, and the condition of the streets has more to do with it than all other causes of dissatisfaction put together. It may be that no one is at fault, but as long as heavy taxes are levied, and the streets still remain in their present condition, there will be complaint. This is a question which it would be well for our city authorities to consider, as it is one which will enter lively into the election of officers for the coming year.
