government supplies. At the close of the war the Federal government, of course, counter-confiscated the Mint and its contents. In 1866 a bill passed both houses of Congress, authorizing the removal of the machinery for coining in this mint to Philadelphia, and also authorizing the sale of the building and other machinery, which bill has never been repealed. The coining machinery was removed to Philadelphia in 1866, and Col. C. J. Cowles, the present superintendent, tells us that he saw it there introduced in the North Carolina Legislature lying under an old shed, where it probably remains even unto this day. Since 1866 this Mint has been used as an assay office, and nothing has been done looking to the sale of it authorized by the act of Congress.


