### The Air Line.

There were more slides on the Air Line  
on Saturday night and Sunday, and on  
Saturday afternoon there had been no  
through train until last evening about 7  
o'clock, when the last slide having been  
removed from Cathey's cut, the train came  
through on schedule time, the track being  
clear the whole length of the road. It has  
been estimated that the rains have cost the  
Air Line Railroad, in actual damage, losing  
freights, passengers, &c., through unavoid-  
able delays, not less than \$100,000.

### Accident on the Charlotte, Columbia & Augusta Railroad.

On Sunday the down mail train on the  
Charlotte, Columbia & Augusta Railroad,  
encountered a rock of about 25 or 30 cubic  
feet, in Springs' cut, 2 miles below Morrow's  
Turn. The engine struck it with con-  
siderable force, and was a good deal damaged  
by the collision, which also occasioned the  
tearing up of the track for a little distance.  
The shifting engine from Charlotte, went  
down and carried the train on to Columbia,  
leaving Morrow's late in the evening. No  
one was hurt, and \$50 will cover all the  
damage. The up train reached Charlotte a  
very little behind time.

### A Request.

We ask it as a favor, and we know that  
we have no right to ask it, that people will

### Off for the Pen.

into popularity a performance which has no  
merit in it, and to secure any good words  
from us, Mr. Powell will find it necessary  
to send a good company.

### A Fraud.

Last week a man, giving his name as  
Rosenthal, and claiming to be a member of  
the firm of Rosenthal & Goldstein, of Dur-  
ham, N. C., came to this city and bought a  
considerable quantity of goods. He made  
purchases of an assorted stock from many  
different merchants of the place, left each one  
with instructions to pack the goods and send  
them to the depot, and he would call in a  
few moments and settle. He bought in all  
about \$5,000 worth. One firm suspected  
him, and telegraphed to a friend in Durham  
for information concerning him. This friend  
replied that there was no such man doing  
business there; that there was a Goldstein,  
and that he was good. The man not call-  
ing at any of the places to settle, as he had  
engaged, none of the merchants shipped the  
goods. One firm sent the goods which  
Rosenthal had bought of them to the depot,  
but sent down afterwards and had them  
brought back. The last seen of the man  
was about 10 o'clock Saturday morning.  
He left one of our business houses at that  
hour, promising to return soon and pay for  
what he had bought, and since that time  
has not been seen.

Rosenthal, as he calls himself, is a man  
about 5 feet 6 inches high, weighs about 125  
pounds, has brown or sandy hair, and a  
new stubby beard. His whole appearance  
is rather unsteady.

There is little doubt that his design was  
to have the goods shipped to Durham,  
where they would be met by a confederate  
and spirited away. Happily his scheme  
failed, and our merchants lose nothing save  
the time and trouble of packing the goods.  
Mr. Rosenthal, if, indeed, that be his real  
name, is unquestionably a great "beat," and  
we call upon the press of the State to "pass  
him round."

### DIRECTIONS FOR MIXING.

Select a dry place under cover, and spread  
out sufficient seed, that have been well mois-  
tened, over the floor, about three or four  
inches deep; then spread evenly over the  
seed the same weight of "Patapasco Grange  
Mixture," then on in the same manner,  
seed and fertilizer, until the amount re-  
quired is composted.

The pile should stand until the germ of  
the seed is killed, and as much longer as the  
planter's convenience will allow.  
Any other good material, such as stable  
manure or wood mold, will be an additional  
benefit. If the soil to which the compost is  
to be applied is poor and deficient in vege-  
table matter, the proportion of seed to the  
fertilizer should be increased so as to restore  
its wasted condition.
