

THE LEGISLATURE OF NORTH CAROLINA

Senate met at 10 o'clock, Lieutenant-Governor Armfield in the chair. Prayer by Rev. Dr. Pritchard. Journal of yesterday read and approved.

Mr. Graham, a bill to prevent discrimination in freight tariffs by railroads operating in this State. Referred.

Mr. Linney, a joint resolution of inquiry in reference to deposits made by the State Treasurer; appoints a committee of five from the two Houses to enquire whether the Treasurer is not indebted to the State by reason of interest received and not accounted for on the deposits of the public monies. Committee to have power to send for persons and papers. Adopted under a suspension of the rules.

SENATE BILL PASSED THIRD READING. Senate bill empowering the commissioners of Cabarrus county to sell their present courthouse and jail lots and to levy a special tax.

Senate bill to construe an act passed at the session of 1872-73, entitled an act in relation to fences and for the better protection of crops. Empowers county commissioners to cast the vote in all cases pertaining to this law when the vote shall be equal on the part of any township.

House bill amending chapter 120, section 1, laws of 1871-72. Prevents any deputy or assistant clerk of the Superior Court from practicing law in the judicial court held for said county.

The vote by which the bill for the protection of birds in Davidson, Randolph, Rowan and other counties, passed its third reading was reconsidered and goes on the calendar.

Mr. Mills' bill to establish a Branch Insane Asylum was considered. It provides for the appointment of Messrs. (names not recalled), as commissioners, to superintend the building of the said Asylum; the sum of not more than \$50,000 annually, to be expended for the purpose, and that labor from the penitentiary be employed in building the said Asylum.

The question was discussed at much length, under various propositions, and the following places were put in nomination as the site for the Asylum: Raleigh, Statesville, Asheville, Morganton, Hickory, High Point, Tarboro, Elizabeth City and Newbern.

Pending the discussion, the Senate adjourned till 7 o'clock. Various resolutions concerning final accounts were discussed without any result being attained, owing to the time necessary to consider the revenue and other bills now to be adopted.

A resolution by Mr. Jenkins, restricting all debate to ten minutes, except by the consent of a majority of the whole Senate, was adopted.

The Committee on Constitutional Reform will meet in the Senate Chamber at 8:30 o'clock Monday evening.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. The House met at 10 o'clock, Mr. Speaker Robinson in the chair. Journal of yesterday read and approved.

By Mr. Reid, a bill to promote the agricultural interests of the State. Referred.

By Mr. Pinnix, a resolution providing that no member shall speak more than 10 minutes on any question, unless by permission of a majority of the House. Referred.

The bill to commute, compromise and settle the State debt came up as the unfinished business of yesterday, and discussed regardless of intervening "special orders," which were postponed for the bill.

Messrs. Tate, Moring, Melver, Spears, King, Mebane, Sorrent, and McRae discussed the general merits of the bill.

Mr. Mendhall offered an amendment to insert in section 5, after "the Treasurer," "by and with the advice and consent of the Governor and Auditor." Adopted.

The bill then passed its second reading. On motion of Mr. Tate, the bill was then made the special order for Wednesday next.

Mr. Guder, from the Joint Select Committee to draft resolutions expressive of the sense of the House in regard to the death of Hon. H. H. Bell, a member of this body from Gates, submitted a report, which was ordered to be spread on the minutes.
