The Change of the Gauge of the North

Carolina Railroad. Sunday morning the rather unexpected announcement was made in this city that a large force of hands was at work on the North Carolina Railroad, changing the

gauge to conform to that of the Richmond & Danville Railroad, by virtue of a decision which the Supreme Court of North Carolina rendered on Thursday last. Though this report proved not true in fact, all the preparations were made at this end of the line for the work to begin yesterday morning. The day express train left as usual Sunday morning, and about 12:50 p. m., the train which had arrived at 6:30 a. m., left for the Company's Shops, taking with it all the cars in the yard here, excepting a Pullman Palace, with adjustable trucks.

Yesterday morning hands began work here, under charge of Col. Walker. A force had begun at Greensboro Sunday night, and yesterday morning 400 men were at k along the line, under the direction of section masters. The latest advices we have of the progress of the work, were received about 9 o'clock last night, a telegram having reached this city then, stating that the work was about half done. It was to have been prosecuted all last night, and it is confidently announced by the railroad officers here, that by noon to-day the gauge will be changed the entire length of the road between Charlotte and Greensboro The mail train, it is now very certain, will leave here to-night at 10 o'clock, as usual. It was thought at one time yesterday that a train could leave Charlotte this morning, and, with this view, the authorities of the Charlotte, Columbia & Augusta Railroad, were telegraphed at Columbia to make up a train and send it on to Charlotte. An engine, two coaches, a sleeper and a baggage and express car were accordingly sent, but were not needed, the progress of the work not having been so rapid as was

After to-day, trains can run the entire distance of the Piedmont Air-Line Railroad, from Richmond to Atlanta, without change, the gauge being uniform all the way.


