The Change of Gauge-The Legislature and the Governor Take a'Hand in the

Matter-Progress of the Work, &c. It was foreshadowed in these columns resterday morning, that the work of widening the gauge of the North Carolina Railroad, would probably be completed yesterday and a train leave Charlotte last night on schedule time. Such, however, was not the case. The work seems to have been clumsily managed, and the progress made has been very slow. This matter has been the principal topic of conversation since Sunday, and yesterday renewed interest was manifested when a new aspect was placed on the face of affairs-when it was announced that the legislative and executive branches of the State Government had stepped in to prevent, if possible, the change of the gauge. At a late hour on Monday night, Capt

John A Wilson, the agent of the road in this city, received a telegram from Gov Brogden, instructing him that on that day (Monday) the Legislature had passed an act making it a crime to interfere with the gauge of any railroad in the State, and to lay any one so interfering liable to fine and imprisonment. He stated further, that, as Governor of the State, it was incumbent upon him to execute this law. Similar telegrams were sent to each depot agent on the line of the road. Some of the agents refused to receive them, and those who did, gave them no heed. No legal process can be served by telegraph, and the work all along the line went on, no:withstanding these dispatches. The telegram received here was addressed "to the agent of the North Carolina Railroad." Capt, Wilson held that he is not the agent of the North Carolina Railroad, and has not been for three years, but the agent of the North Carolina Division of the Richmond & Danville Railroad; so that he did not feel

himself bound to respect the message. Meanwhile the work goes on, slowly though it may be. The latest news we had last night was, that a gap of five miles remained to be changed between Charlotte ar d Salisbury, and that, as far as could be learned (the work being much scattered) the change will be completed by about 4 o'clock this afternoon. Our judgment is from what we can learn, that the first train will leave Charlotte to-night about 10 o'clock, this being the schedule of the mail train. An engine and train of cars have been secured from the Charlotte, Columbia & Augusts Railroad, and will leave here upon the first official notification of the completion of the
