The Carolina Central.

With the coming of Spring, this road is str vightening out and getting over the troubles which it encountered during the Winter. It has been running with almost perfect re gularity lately, there having been no accident since the loads of molasses and guano were dumped into a creek between here and Monroe, until Friday, when a freight train ran off, necessitating a transfer, but enabling passengers to get into Charlotte not a great while behind time.

By the by, we learn that the Western Division of this road is doing treble the business it ever did before. The merchants along its line and beyond its Western terminius, are buying unusually heavy stocks

A Bad Place.

We would like to be clothed with municipal powers long enough to fix up the sidew.lk on 6th street between church and Porlar Streets just below Mr. Roedigers. There is about ten feet in the side-walk which is almost impassable. Two of the Aldermen of the 4th ward pass over this place ge nerally six times a day, and it seems to us that they ought to call the attention of the proper authorities to as important a matter. Let it be repaired forthwith.

Rev. W. S. Plumer, D. D. This venerable and distinguished minister arrived in Charlotte on Friday night,

and remained until yesterday afternoon, when he left for Davidson College, where he will preach to-day. Dr Plumer was the temporary pastor of the Second Presbyterian Church, of this city, during last Summer, and the people of Charlotte and particularly the members of that congregation, have the most loving recollections of him. He was warmly greeted yesterday by many and true friends.

This is Easter Sunday, the time of the Resurrection, the festival of rejoicing. The day is celebrated by several Christian churches with great pomp and ceremony, and in the Catholic Church, the services are exceedingly impressive. Anthems are sung, the church is illuminated and decorated, and general rejoieing is indulged in. On tomorrow, (Easter Sunday) there will be holiday festivals and other entertainments. The Catholic Church of this city is always filled to its utmost on Easter Sunday, ond there is no doubt that a very large crowd will attend the services there to-day.

Interesting Extract from "Tarleton's Campaigns "

A friend of ours has recently obtained possession of a highly interesting old book, called "Tarleton's Campaigns, in 1780 and 1781," and has done us the kindness to copy for us the extract, which we append herewith. It tells of adventures encountered right here in Charlotte, and near to it, and cannot fail to prove of interest. We will ay that "Polk's Mill," which is referred to sell's mill, two miles from Charlotte. The book from which the extract is taken, was printed in "London in 1787 for J. Cadell, and the part which we publish is to be

found on page 158, and is as follows: "On the 22d, (Sept. 1780) Earl Cornwallis directed the British Legion and light infantry to cross the Catawba at Blair's ford, in order to form the advance guard for the immediate possession of Charlotte town.

The junction of the light troops had been prevented for a few days by a violent fever, which had attacked Lieutenant Col. Tarleton, and which yet disabled him from holding his situation, when his regiment moved forwards. Several convalescent men of the army having relapsed; the 71 men under McArthur, were left near Blair's Mill, to afford protection to the sick, to cover the mills in the neighbourhood, and to hold communication with Camden, till the arrival of the additional supplies. Earl Cornwallis moved forwards as soon as the legion under Major Hanger joined him. A party of militia fired at the advanced dragowns and light infantry as they entered the town, and a more considerable body appeared drawn up near the Court House. The conduct of the Americans excitet suspicion in the British; an ambuscade was apprehended by the light troops, who moved forwards for some time with great circumspection; a charge of cavalry, under Major Hanger, dissipated the ill-grounded jealousy and totally dispersed the militia. The pursuit lasted some time, and about thirty of the enemy were killed and taken. The King's troops did not come out of this skirmish unburt Major Hanger, and Captains Campbell and McDonald were wounded, and twelve noncommissioned officers and men were killed

and wounded. "Charlotte town afforded some convenien" cies, blended with great disadyantages. The Mills in its neighbourhood were supposed of sufficient consequence to render it for the present an eligible position and in future a necessary port, when the army advanced; aptness of its intermediate situation between Camden and Salisbury, and the quanwas received. Who says Old Probs don't tity of its mills, did not counterbalance its defects. The town and envirous abounded with inveterate enemies; the plantations in the neighbourhood were small and uncultivated; the roads narrow, and crossed in every direction, and the whole face of the country covered with close and thick woods. In addition to these disadvantages, no estimation could be made of the sentiments of half the inhabitants of North Carolina. whilst the royal wing remained at Charlotte town. It was evident, and it had been frequently mentioned to the King's officers, that the counties of Mecklenburg and Rohan were more hostile to England than any others in America. The vigilance and animosity of these surrounding districts checked the exertions of the eyil affected, and totally destroyed all communication between the King's troops and the loyalists in the other ports of the province. No British commander could obtain any information in that position, which would facilitate his designs, or guide his future conduct. Every report concerning the measures of the Governor from the chunch. The Philadelphia police and Assembly would undoubtably be ambiguous; and all intelligence of the real force and movements of the continentals must be totally unattainable.

"The foraging parties were every day harrassed by the inhabitants, who did not remain at home, to receive payment for the produce of their plantations, but generally fired from covert places, to annoy the British detachments. Ineffectual attempts were made upon conveys coming from Camden. and the intermediate posts at Blair's Mill. but individuals with expresses were frequently murdered. An attempt was directed against the picket at Polk's Mill, two miles from the town; the Americans were gallantly received by Lieutent Guyon, of the 23d regiment; and the fire of his party from a loop-holed building adjoining the mills repulsed the assailants. Notwithstanding the different checks and losses sustained by the militia of the district, they continued their hostilities with unwearied persever of goods, this season, and a good feature connected with this, is that they are making their purchases here and in Wilmington, very few having gone to New York or Baltimore.

Their hostilities with unwearied perseverance; and the British troops were so effectually blockaded in their present position, that very few, out of a great number of messengers, could reach Charlotte town in the beginning of October, to give intelligence of Ferguson's situation."

About senset yesterday eyening, two mules, drawing a country wagon, with four colored passengers on board, three male and one female, took fright near the Air Line depot, and made toward embankment by the railroad platform. All efforts to stop them were in vain, especially so, as one of the mules was blind. So over the embankment went mules, darkies, four sacks of flour and a jug of molasses. The mules and negroes escaped uninjured, although one wheel of CHAHUT DANCERS. the wagon did run over the woman's head, which resulted in little damage to her, but made a considerable dent in the tire of the wheel. The molasses jug suffered severely. Coming in contact with a darkey's head, it was shattered into a thousand fragments, eaving the contents in the bosom of the

The Cotton Statement.

For fear those of our readers who read the comparative cotton sratement, published in our local columns yesterday, failed to notice one fact, we take occasion to again refer to it. Last year, Charlotte handled something over forty thousand bales, and there are those among us who predicted that the cotton carried away from our doors by the Carolina Central, and the direct trade movement, would so limit the operations of the market, as to make the aggregate fall far below the figures of last year. The very reverse is the case. Up to the close of business on the 26th, (Friday) four thousand, one hundred and fifty bales more cotton had been received, than up to the same period last year. Judging by the receipts up to this time, we may safely count on running our sales up this year to fifty thousand.

Easter Eggs. This is the time for the observance of the memorable custom of dying eggs, to be given away as presents. In almost all christian countries the custom still prevails of eggs being given as a present at Easter time. In Germany they are generally hid by the older people in the gardens under the young gooseberry bushes and other early plants, when they are looked for by bevies of little children, and great is the joy at finding one of peculiar richness in ornament; for they are all decked in gay colors and covered with gold and silver devices.

[COMMUNICATED] Freight on the C. C. Railroad.

MESSES. EDITORS :-The merchants of Charlotte have looked forward to the completion of the Carolina Central Railroad with much solicitude, beieving that the whole upper country would be much benefitted thereby. But it seems that it is to be otherwise.

The subscriber who is a wholesale merchant in Charlotte, was at Buffalo on Friday. He found that flour was shpiped from Wilmington to that point for fifty-five cents. in less than car load lots, while that is the rate by the car load. The C. C. Railway thus shipping flour in small lots, at the same price as by the car load.

The price from Charlotte to Buffalo is forty-five cents, I would inquire how much ustice there is in this to Charlotte merchants, and ask Col Fremont to rise and ex-CHARLOTTE MERCHANT.
