OF THE CITY OF CHARLOTTE

AM directed to call the attention of the citizens of Charlotte to the following orlipance passed December 21st, 1674 : Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, of the city of Charlotte, in council assembled, that the Board may appoint a City Engineer, whose duty it shall be to locate and find the boundaries

of lots and streets, and grade the sidewalks

and drains thereon, when called upon for that purpose.
Section 2. Be it further ordained that hereafter any person building or about to build any house or fence on any site, or con-struct any sidewalk or pavement fronting or bounding on any of the streets of the city of Charlotte, shall be required to have the same located or graded, and the boundaries thereof adjoining such street or streets, fixed and certified to by the city engineer, and in case any person shall construct any house, fence, sidewalk or pavement, as foresaid without having the same located or graded by the city engineer as aforesaid, such person shall be subject to a fine of not more than fifty dollars for each and every offence, at the discretion of the Mayor, provided that in such case, as aforesaid the city engineer, shall be paid for his services by the

party so building, constructing, &c., a fee to be fixed by the Street Committee. Section 3. Be it further ordained that any person who shall injure, move or cause to be moved any of the stakes, set as guides for locating or grading any lot, sidewalks, drains, &c., or shall fail to conform to stakes, by locating or grading in anywise differing therefrom, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and be subject to an imprisonment for a period of not more than thirty days, or to a fine of not more than fifty dollars for each and every offence, at

the discretion of the Mayor. Section 4. Be it further ordained, that the city engineer shall from time to time fix the Easterly corners of the intersections of the different streets, in accordance with the map or plan of the city of Charlotte, already adopted by the city council, and at each of which shall cause to be driven an iron or stone post, said post to be the future guides for establishing the ftreet lines, as well as bench marks in leveling, and fathermore that the same penalties for moving or injuring the location or grade stakes, as prescribed in section 3, shall attach in like manner to any person interfering with the
