3d. That the salary of the city constable shall be 3 percent, for all taxes collected besides his fees of office, and that he shall be required also to perform the duties of chief of police. And that he excute a bond with security to be approved by the Board in the sun of \$10,000, for the faithful discharge of his duties.

4th. That the city constable and six subordinates shall constitute the police force of the city, and the salary of said subordinate police be fixed at \$50 each per month.

On motion of R. M. Oates, it was resolved that the salary of the Clerk and Treasurer be fixed at \$400, and that he be required to give bond in the penal sum of \$5000, with security to be approved by the Board for the faithful performance of duty.

At the suggestions of the Mayor, it was ordered that the present city officers and policemen be continued on duty till the further action of the Board.
