FOREIGN.

Arrest of a Would-be Assassin.—Venice, May 14.—The youth O'Connor, who, on the day of the recovery of the Prince of Wales, attempted to shoot the Queen, was again arrested on the 5th inst. The Queen was holding a reception at Buckingham Palace, and O'Connor was found in the same place in front of the railings from which he, on a former occasion, pointed a pistol at the Queen. He was arrested quietly and sent to Howland Asylum.

The agent of the Inman Line of steamships has received a dispatch from the Captain of the steamship "City of Brussels" containing a report that that vessel was ashore. The Captain reports that the vessel ashore near Carore Point, Ireland, at 11:50 o'clock this evening, a dense fog prevailed at the time. He expects the steamship to come off by high water, which will be about noon. She lies on the west side.

NEW YORK.
Convicts Seize an Engine and Escape.—New York, May 14.—While a freight train was passing under the arch at Sing Sing prison, forty convicts jumped on the engine and presented revolvers at the heads of the engineer and firemen. They compelled them to get off, then cut the engine loose and started southward, abandoning it three miles north of Tarrytown.

MARYLAND.
Seizure of Whisky in Baltimore.—BALTIMORE, May 14.—About five hundred barrels of whisky, the product of the Western distilleries recently closed by the government, have been seized in this city. The seizures were made at five or six different warehouses.

MISSOURI.
Indian Prisoners to Change Quarters.—ST. LOUIS, May 13.—Orders have been issued from headquarters of the army here, that the Indian prisoners now confined at Fort Leavenworth be conveyed to St. Augustine, Fla., and confined in Fort Macon, under special orders.

WISCONSIN.
The Revenue Act to be Tested in Court.—MILWAUKEE, May 14.—The four distilleries which had been released by the court on special bonds, resumed operations yesterday. A dispatch was received from Washington, ordering the officers to stop them until they had given new bonds in place of those given the first of May. The distillers have telegraphed to the distillers at Chicago, St. Louis and elsewhere, proposing to unite with them in testing the constitutionality of the internal revenue act. A favorable reply was received from Chicago, and the distillers have resolved to proceed. They have retained ex-Senator Carpenter to take the question into court.

ALABAMA.
A Postmaster Steals and is Convicted.—MONTGOMERY, May 14.—O. H. Davis, late postmaster at Union Spring, pleaded guilty in the United States Court here, to embezzlement of funds from letters he received. By request of the District Attorney, who stated that there were extenuating circumstances, the lowest punishment, which was a sentence of six months imprisonment and a fine to the amount of the money abstracted, was imposed. Davis was a Republican member of the Legislature in 1872 took his seat at the Court House, which elected Spencer to the Senate, and voted for him for Senator; soon afterwards he was appointed postmaster.

PENNSYLVANIA.
Troubles Times in the Mining Districts.—TYNEN, May 14.—Fifty men went to work at the Harting mine this morning. About 11 o'clock a light look place between the few police and the strikers, and two of the latter were arrested.
