Accommodation Extraordinary.

On Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of last week, Mr Eccles, of the Central Hotel, fed600 persons at each meal, and at each meal on Thursday a fraction over that number, On Wednesday, Thursday and Friday nights he farmished sleeping accommodations for between 350 and 400 guests. The like of this was never accomplished before by any hotel in North Carolina. Not only were 1,500 people a day fed for three days, but they were fed well, and when the cnowd departed there remained enough provisions which had been provided for the Centennial, to have fed it for a week longer. In all this year throng, the same promptitude and attention was manifested by the servents as on ordinary occasions. The handling of this crowd was a feat which few notelist could have accomplished.

State vs. Wm. Elwood-The Defendant of the Mecklenburg celebration. In after Convicted of Murder.

The entire time of the Superior Court, yesterday, was occupied in the trial of Wm. Elwood, for the murder of Aleck Sanford. The defence introduced no testimony at all, and the State recalled none of its witnesses of the day before. Accordingly the argument began upon the assembling of Court, when Gov. Vance opened the case for the defence. He was followed by Solicitor Montgomery for the State, and he by Capt Durham for the defence. The case was ably conducted, both in the defence and prosecution. His Honor then charged the jury, laying down the law in the case. He held that the killing baving been alleged and remaining undenied, the prisoner at the bar was guilty of murder, and that it was the duty of the jury so to find.

The jury retired, and, after an absence of about two hours, returned, and said through their foreman that they found William Elwood guilty of murder. Upon this announcement the defence made a motion for a new trial. The motion for the order was argued by Gov. Vance and Cot. Hoke, and after the arguments His Honor said that he would reserve his decision and take the matter into consideration. Whatever he may determine upon he will perhaps state this morning.

To-day has been set for the trial of Lee Ardrey. Horace Massey and Mary Massey, all colored, for the murder of a companion in a frolic, in Providence township of this county, during the holidays last Christmas. A special venire of 75 has been summoned in this case.

Old Inscription.

At Hopewell Church, twelve miles north of Charlotte, are buried Gen Davidson, who fell at Cowan's Ford, and Francis Bradley, one of the heroes of the battle of McIntvre's Graham, who lived several years in that neighborhood, that there is no stone to mark the grave of the former, and the exact spot is in some doubt. Above the graye of the latter some friend has erected the following memorial: Upon a tablet of soapstone is engraved two swords crossed, beneath them a snield bearing 13 stars, with an eagle on either side, and below on a scroll: "Arma Libertatis." Then follows "In Memory of Francis Bradley, A Friend to Liberty and was privately slain by the enemies of his country, Nov. ye 14th, A. D. 1780, aged 37 years." He was known as one of the boldest of the hornets. A legend is handed down of his attempt to kill or capture the British commander of this post: It is said that en one occasion he and his wife came into the town, during its occupancy by the British, and, concealing himself in a chinquepin thicket in the lot now occupied by the First Presbyterian Church, sent his wife out in the street to sell the butter. She sent for the British chief to come out and examine the butter, but whether he suspected a decoy, or whether it was from some other cause, he did not go himself but sent an orderly.
