TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

FOREIGN.

The Arctic Expedition—Boynon's Swim—Destructive Fire—Strikes Ended—Royalty on a Visit.

LONDON, May 29.—All the morning journals have articles on the Arctic expedition, the departure of which is fixed for four o'clock this afternoon.

Paul Boynon landed at Falkstone at two thirty o'clock this morning, showing but slight signs of distress. He was loudly cheered.

BERLIN, May 29.—The Judicial investigation shows the offer of Weisinger to assassinate Bismarck.

St. John's, May 29.—A quarter of a million fire occurred here to-day, St. Luke's church, sixty buildings, and a ship on the stocks, were burned. A hundred families are homeless.

LONDON, May 29.—The strike in South Wales is ended, the men submitting to a reduction.

BERLIN, May 29.—The King and Queen of Sweden are here visiting. It is thought the visit indicates Sweden's support of the policy of the three emperors.

ELECTRIC FLASHES.

HOLYOKE, May 29.—Seventy-one are dead and twenty-two fatally burned. Twenty-seven were injured. Of the dead, fifty-five are females and sixteen males.

WORCESTER, May 29.—The granite block on Main street, nearly opposite the City Hall, was burned to-day. The cause was mansard roofs. Loss, over a half million.

CEDAR RAPIDS, May 29.—J. H. Eccleston, was elected Bishop by the Episcopal Convention on the 16th ballot, by one majority.

OMAHA, May 29.—Col. Mills has destroyed the outfit and provisions of the Black Hills expedition, leaving them only enough to last them to civilization. Gordon, the leader, is a prisoner.

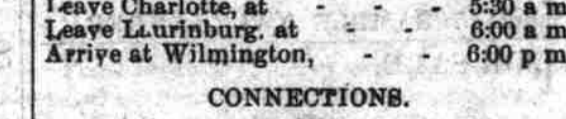
