

Burglars are on the move in Wilmington. The Shelby Presbyterian Church is about completed. The young men of Greensboro are organizing an artillery company. They dug up another skeleton in Wilmington on Saturday. The line of steamers between Wilmington and Philadelphia has been discontinued. Capt Blake, recently injured on the North Carolina Railroad, has fully recovered. Wake will nominate Democratic Convention candidates on the 25th inst. There are 229 Masonic Lodges in active operation in the State, with a membership of 11,125. A railroad meeting will be held in Oxford on the 17th inst. The people there are excited on the subject of railroad communication. Rev Father McNamara, formerly of Raleigh, is about to commence the publication of a paper in New York under the title of The Celtic National. The Salem Press learns that John Smith, son of Levi K. Smith, and aged 20 years, was drowned in Okeechiee mill pond, near Hall's ferry, on Saturday last, it is supposed in a cramp. The centennial anniversary of Bethany Presbyterian Church, Irigold county, will be celebrated on the 25th of August. Nathaniel Boyden is to be tried at Statesville Court on Tuesday next for forgery, and Chief Justice Pearson is summoned as a witness in the case. The Statesville American protests against the avallion of the franchise in Charlotte, thinking that, if it is unprofitable at present, it should be converted into a mint of coinage. The Stockton Gold Mine was sold at auction in Merion Saturday last. The purchaser was Mrs. Richardson, of the King's Mountain mine, who bid it in at \$9,200. The editor of the Statesville American, while on a recent visit to Washington City, called on President Grant, and was pleased with his reception and with the conversation and bearing of the President. A German citizen of Greensboro got into water too deep for him, and was about to drown, having gone down the third time, when assistance arrived. Dot is his goot. The Raleigh News says that several gentlemen of that vicinity have employed hands from the Penitentiary to the number of 120 in chopping out cotton. They pay the State 60 cents a day for each convict, the State furnish and a guard. The Hamer says that Col. B. F. Logan and Capt James Wells are about to succeed in organizing a Military Company in Shelby. About 50 persons have gone into it, and at least 50 others are expected to enter in a few days. Regular military uniforms will be ordered for the company in a short time; also a supply of guns. Tarboro Southern: On Saturday last a negro boy was discovered to late to stop the engine, lying on the track between two cross-ties sound asleep. The entire train passed over without inflicting any serious injury. The cow catcher bruised his head and the brake irons scared one knee. A remarkable escape. The horse which drew the buggy in which Mrs Zoeller, of Tarboro, was riding with her two little children, took fright last Sunday and ran away, upsetting the buggy and throwing the occupants against a tree with frightful results. Mrs Zoeller is in a critical condition, and the children were badly cut and bruised. (So) says the Southerner. The Raleigh News says that, under a recent decision of Attorney-General T. L. Hargrove, all National Banks doing business in the State are required to file with the Secretary of State an annual statement of their assets and liabilities under the same ruling as is applied to Insurance Companies. Salem Press: A youth, whose girl went off on the train the other morning, went home, and telling his mother that he didn't care about living any longer, went out in the garden and hanging out his pocket knife—finished sharpening the ends of some bean pliers, and then he did what he wanted at noon. Statesville Landmark: Those who were deprived of witnessing the Centennial celebration last week can have their curiosity fully gratified by a visit to the tent of our accomplished artist, Capt Broadway. He succeeded in getting about 60 different negatives, representing the celebration in all of its various aspects. The execution of the work is very fine, and the views are very cheap at \$3 per dozen. Salisbury, Intelligence: A man by the name of Robinson, from the country, was tried yesterday before Justice Haughton, on a charge of murder. The facts were these: He and a negro were carrying a piece of timber. Robinson told the negro to drop his end, and at the same time threw his own, and the negro was too slow; his shoulder blade was broken by the post, and he died. When upon a warrant was issued, and Mr Robinson was brought before Justice Haughton for trial. He was released. The Wilmington Star says: Mr L. E. Rice, of the Cape Fear Building Company will leave here this week for Mantanzas, Cuba, for the purpose of directing the erection at that place of two frame buildings, the lumber for which, already arranged for, immediately upon his arrival, will go on the same vessel. The work of adding and finishing the material has been done at the works of the Cape Fear Building Company at Abbottsburg. This is another evidence of the foreign appreciation of the industries of our section. Mr Geo W Harper, of New Hanover county, was driving along home, after dark last Friday night, when some person called out to him from behind to know "if that was Mr. Bonum." He replied in the negative and urged his horse forward, when several shots were fired at him. One of these took effect in his cheek and lodged near the base of the brain, while four others lodged in other portions of his body. The horse was struck and the tall and fat man was thrown. Mr Harper of the car was critically wounded. Mr Kaye Bonum who lives near where the shooting occurred, had killed two dogs belonging to a negro, and the negro had threatened to kill him.
