NEW YORK.

Handsome Honors to the Charleston Infantry.

New York, June 16.—At the breakfast given to the Charleston Washington Infantry, yesterday, a letter was read from Gov. Tilden, expressing regrets at his inability to be present, and welcoming them to the State of New York. This was followed by a brief address from Gen. Woodward, of the Governor's staff, and from Col. Marshall, of the Seventh Regiment.

FOREIGN.

Failures in London—Alleged 'Fraud' Acquitted, &c., &c.

BERLIN, June 16.—The session of the Prussian Parliament has formally closed.

Bismarck, before leaving for the country, received the foreign representatives, and gave express assurances of the peaceful disposition of Germany. Whatever result the present trial of Armin may have, it is sure to be ultimately referred to the supreme tribunal by appeal, either by the defence or the prosecution.

DUBLIN, June 16.—The American rifle team has arrived, and was received with great enthusiasm.

ROME, June 16.—The debate on the public safety bill is continued.

LONDON, June 16.—Alexander Collier & Co., commission merchants, have failed; also, Shand & Co., East India merchants.

The reported liabilities of Alex. Collier & Co., are \$15,000,000.

VIENNA, June 16.—The Provincial Court acquitted Weisenger of the charge of attempting to defraud the father of General Bried. In the course of the trial, Weisenger declared that he was an adherent of Prince Bismarck, and an enemy of the Ultramontanes. His sole intention was to allure the Jesuit to acquiesce in an offer to assassinate Bismarck, and thereby give the latter a reason for more energetic proceedings against the Catholics. He hoped that Bismarck would reward him for his zeal.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 16. For Middle and South Atlantic States, nearly stationary pressure, warmer northeast to southeast winds, clear and partly cloudy weather.

MARYLAND.

Basis of Settlement Agreed on by the Directors of the Baltimore & Ohio R. R. Company.

BALTIMORE, June 16.—The official Directors of the Baltimore & Ohio R. R. Co., at a special meeting to day, ratified the basis of settlement as agreed on by President Scott, and Vice-President King, making a single amendment which it is expected will meet the approval of the Board of Pennsylvania directors.

NEW YORK.

Another Civil Rights Indictment.

New York, June 16.—Some weeks ago W. W. Tiltson, the Treasurer of Booth's Theatre was charged before Commissioner Davenport, with having violated the provisions of the civil rights bill in refusing to sell a ticket to Wm. R. Davis, a colored man, and as such not entitled to a seat in the theatre, elsewhere than in a portion of the upper part of the house, set apart for colored persons. At the time of Tiltson's arrest, his counsel claimed that he had not violated the law inasmuch as the prohibition of the bill as to color, did not apply to theatres which were managed simply as a private business speculation, subject to such regulations as to admission as their proprietor might deem proper to impose. Tiltson waived an examination, and gave bail to await the action of the United States grand jury. During the sessions of the grand jury, Davis has been before it several times, but failed to impress the jurors that he had a case that they were warranted in entertaining, and they therefore presented no bill against Tiltson. In view of the interest taken in this case, this action of the grand jury is important.

WASHINGTON.

The Case for Corrupting U. S. Officials—Important Mill Decision.

WASHINGTON, June 16.—There are no new developments in the case for corrupting United States officials. The point is raised that the persons bribed were temporary clerks and not United States officials.

In view of the water routes throughout the South, the following is important. Judge Wylie, in the Equity Court, on the case Georgetown mill cases, that of Ray vs. the Chesapeake & Ohio Canal Company, decided that the contract of Mr. Ray entitled him to receive as much water as had been coming to his mill before the canal company undertook to make change, and be made perpetual, the injunction restraining the canal company from diminishing the supply of water to Ray's mills and from interfering with the gauge.

KANSAS.

Disappearance of the Grasshoppers.

LEAVENWORTH, June 16.—The grasshoppers have disappeared from this region. The air for the past four days, has been black with them, flying North. The farmers are preparing to replant.

MARYLAND.

Important Conference of Railroad Men.

BALTIMORE, June 16.—A special meeting of the Board of Directors of the Baltimore & Ohio Rail Road, to consider the bases of settlement, agreed upon by President Scott, and Vice-President King, at the Fifth Avenue Hotel on Friday, June 11th, was held to-day, and adjourned shortly afterward, at twelve o'clock, the session lasting about an hour. The proceedings were strictly private, and will not be given to the press, it is stated by the officials, until after three o'clock to-day, if then. This may be to prevent speculation in stocks by outside parties. A number of reporters, representing papers in Washington, New York, and other cities, are about the building, eagerly waiting the publicity of the proceedings.

LATER.—It is understood that the agreement is for a period of 10 years, the companies to agree upon moderate rates between all competing points, which will be maintained by both. The contract can only be terminated by a resolution of the respective boards, a special committee to be appointed by each board, to whom shall be referred all matters of difference, if any may arise, relative to the practical working of the arrangement, and with power to adjust all complaints between the two companies. The Pennsylvania Company has its lines between Philadelphia and New York to the B. & O. R. R. in the same towns, and they give other connecting roads at Philadelphia. This agreement, it is believed, will be of a permanent character. It is understood that the details of the agreement will not be published.

FOREIGN.

Epidemic Abating—Death of an Eminent Man.

LONDON, June 16.—Fiji Island advices, report a slight abatement of the measles epidemic.

EDINBURGH, June 16.—The Rev. Wm. Arnatt, the eminent author and divine, is dead. He has visited this country three times. His last visit was to the late Evangelical Alliance in N. York.

MONTREAL, June 16.—The union of the Presbyterian Church and the church of Scotland, has been consummated. The united church is to be designated as the Presbyterian Church of Canada.

INDIANA.

A Bank Robbed of \$5,000 to \$7,000.

INDIANAPOLIS, June 16.—During a heavy storm yesterday, two men and a woman drove to the Central Bank. The woman engaged one of the clerks in conversation at the carriage, the two men entered the bank and began talking with the cashier, who was presently set at work figuring out interest on a large sum which they desired to loan. While the cashier was thus engaged, one slipped into the pockets of the other, packages to the amount of from \$5,000 to \$7,000 and got off with it. No arrests yet.
