Contrary to our expectations or desire we were asked to test the efficiency and scholarly attainments of the young ladies of several of the classes. Problems selected at random in mathematics were solved with ease and accuracy, Sentences of latin, in Cresar, and Horace selected in the same manner were correctly translated and properly parsed, in a manner which indicated that the work of education in passing over these studies had been thorough and pains taking on the part of the professors, and properly understood by the students. Without invidiousness we must accord to both teacher and pupil high proficiency on the part of one as an educator, which is not attained in a less degree on the part of the other as a pupil. We only wish that our space would permit us to properly commend this noble in


