The Water Works Question

This is a matter which has engaged the attention of the present Board of Aldermen to a considerable extent and which has long been the talk of citizens generally. There is no discussion concerning the need of them ? this is admitted on all hands, and the only question is, whether the city can afford them. We think it can afford to have them better than it can afford to do without them. A friend of ours who was in Rome, Ga., recently, examined the water works there, and put on paper the result of his investigation Considering the interest now felt here in this matter, we publish some of the leading items of material and cost: Main pipe leading to the tank, 10 inches, 1,500 feet; pipe to street, 10 inches, 2,000 feet; disributing pipe, 8 inches, 1,200 feet; same 6 inches, 2,000; same 4 inches, enough to make 4 miles in all supplying 225 houses, at about \$5,000, including factories, railroads, &c. The pipe cost in Philadelphia, 80 and frieght, but can now be bought for 36. The tank is 65 feet high, taking water at the bottom. Distance from well to base of lank, 150. The pressure always shows at the works on the gauge about 80 lbs. at full head; that is 150 and 05, The capacity of the tank is about 240,000 gallons.
