The United States Branch Mint at Char-lette.

Just at this time, just as the Branch Mint in this city has been discontinued, we think that a brief history of the institution will prove interesting to our readers; and with this idea we have gathered together what- ries were added to the number of delegates. ever facts we could concerning its establish- The following is the list :/ ment and its subsequent career, down to the H C Jones, S B Alexander, Dr M M Orr, last.

Bofar as is known or can be ascentained, the establishment of a Mint in this State was first me sted about the year 1830, and pressed with much energy, the miners, then a host scattered over the counties of Rowan, Davidson, Randolph, Montgomery, Cabarrus, Anson, Mecklenburg, Lincoln and Rutherford, complaining that they were extorted apon by the Banks. The grievance was urged upon the General Assembly, at its ses-

smith, of Rutherfordton, having considerable skill in metals and in engraving, began to assay and coin those pieces, which were known as "Bechtler coins" once so common in our current circulation, but now becoming quite rare. These coins were of the denominations of \$1 00, \$2.50 and \$5 00 Some of these coins are marked "A. Bechtler," who was a son and succeeded his father in the business.

When the gold region had extended and widened itself through the upper districts of South Carolina, Congress heeded the cry, and March 3d, 1835, witnessed the passage of a bill authorizing the establishment of three branch Mints-Charlotte, Dahlonega, and New Orleans-appropriating \$50,000 to each. In a little over two years after the passing of this act, the branch Mint at Charlette went into operation, Col John A Wheeler, since famous for his Notes on North Carolina History, being Superintendent. The first deposit was made Dec 4th, 1837, by Irwin & Elms-the first visitor was David Johnson, Columbia, S C., who registered Oct 19th, 1837, 1919 and a min

July, 1844, this Mint was burned down at south wing, while the workmen engaged in putting on a new roof were came near being the death of the institution; rebuild it, it was met with a resolution to abolish it. The struggle came at last and the appropriation was obtained mainly through the untiring efforts of the late Hon. D. M. Barringer, then Congressman from this District. The mint was rebuilt in 1845 46, at a cost of about \$40,000. The coinage at this Branch Mist was as

The coins of the Charlotte Branch Mint were designated a "C;" those of New Orleans with an "O," and those of Dahlonega with a "D" COD (the two Mints last named were established at the same time as the one here, as remarked above). 
