Stamps on Foregn Bills. A circular from the commission er of inter-

nal revenue at Washington, dated June 30, 1875, says: "In a decision (of the department) concerning the stamp tax upon bank checks drafts, orders or youchers, &c., it was held that drafts or bills drawn in the United States upon a foreign country need not be stamped, not being vouchers in the meaning of the law: while in this country that ruling is, from and after this date, reversed. The act of March 1875 imposes the stamp tax of two cents upon every bank check, draft or order or voucher, for the payment of any sum of money whatsoever, drawn upon any bank, banker or trust company."

After a Rascal, A negro named Noah Craige allas George Noah, recently forged orders for goods to the amount of \$30 or \$40, on a fi m in Salisbury, and escaped to this city. Previous to this, he had broken open a Lutheran Church in Rowan county, and stolen from it several things of value. We again call public attention to the fact that the time for making returns to the City Clerk and Treasurer, of articles subject to taxation, expires on the 20th inst. It is of great importance that these returns be made between now and the time specified. Every person who fails so to do, is liable, as we have before stated, to a penalty of \$200, and his name is sure to appear in the delinquent list, which will certainly be made out. A good many persons seem to be under the impression that, when they make returns to Mr Martin, they cover the whole ground, but such is not the case: that is only for State and county, while this of which we have been speaking, is for city, and is an entirely different matter. Separate returns must be made, and it were well they were made at once.

A Narrow Escape.

The wife of Mr John Kuck, who lives six miles from this city, made a narrow escape from death by lightning, during a thunder storm, a few evenings ago. She was standing near the fire place when the electric current passed down the chimney, scattering sparks of fire all over the room and giving her a shock of such severity that she did not recover from the effects of it for 24 hours. A neighbor, sitting near by Mrs Kuck, was not injured, and neither the house nor the chimney were damaged.

We use this incident to again warn our ders of the danger of sitting in front of fire places or in air currents, during the prevalence of thunder storms. Almost every person killed by lightning, is killed either while sheltered under a tree or while sitting or standing in a current of air. Too much care cannot be exercised on this point.

The Temperance Meeting Last Night. Quite a respectable number of persons assembled at the First Presbyterian Church, last evening, to attend the temperance meeting which was held under the auspices of the Young Men's Christian Association. The services of the evening were opened with music, and a prayer by Rev Dr Chapman. R N Littlejohn, Esq., presided, and, in a few well chosen sentences, introduced the first speaker of the evening, Geo E Wilson, Esq. Mr Wilson did not deal largely in harrowing stories, nor draw ridiculously improbable caricatures, as many temperance orators do, but argued against the use of alcoholic drinks like a sensible man. He started out with the presumption that no one would deny that liquor is a curse; referred to the position of many eminent men that drunkenness is a disease and expressed the opinion that there is much reason in this theory, did not believe that intemperance could ever be stopped by legislative enactment, and thought moral suasion the best means of restraining men from this vice. His remarks were well
