The Raleigh Record says that on last Tuesday night, a riotous mob of about 100 persons, who had been one of the parties to a riot on the Saturday previous, was released from the guard house by unknown persons and the prison set on fire. But for the heavy rain on that night, the whole town would probably have been burned down.


