Neon Dispatches. THE FLOODS.

Further Reports from the Overflow.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—The Mississippi is eight inches above the danger line at Helena; it has risen an inch at Memphis, two inches at Vicksburg, nine inches at Cairo, and has fallen seven inches at St. Louis.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 5.—A dispatch from Terre Haute says the Wabash river is steadily falling. Railways have begun transferring passengers and mails can get through to-morrow. At Seymour the Ohio and Mississippi bridge is gone, and there are several washouts on that road besides. This city has appeared to be the centre of the storm, extending about one hundred miles in each direction. The total damage to railroads, crops and private property in this congressional district is estimated at ten million dollars.

FOREIGN.

Preparing to Wipe Out Insurgents—Tribunes in Europe on Account of D. S. & Co.

LONDON, Aug. 5.—A Berlin special says the Turks are collecting a large force to crush the Herzogorians with one blow.

Ten thousand strangers arrived in Dublin yesterday, to attend the O'Connell centenary.

The officers of the Union Bank say that no arrangements have been made with that institution for the redemption of Duncan, Sherman & Co.'s letters of credit, in the hands of travellers. Negotiations therefore have been pending since the failure, but have not been completed, and the longer they are postponed there is less probability of a successful result.

A letter received here from Americans in Paris, says that over one thousand holders of the suspended firm's letters of credit, have been heard from in Germany alone. Many of them are utterly destitute of funds and have been compelled to apply to the local authorities or to the American Consul for relief. One lady, a teacher, of Massachusetts, had but thirty francs in money when she heard of the failure. The American and English people where she was staying, subscribed sufficient funds to pay her expenses to Hamburg, from which place she took steerage passage home. Appeals for aid from persons holding these letters, come from all directions. A document stating these facts and denouncing the house, is preparing for publication.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

GREENVILLE, Aug. 5.—An altercation took place here this morning, between Col. S. S. Crittenden, editor of the "Enterprise and Mountaineer," and James M. Bunyon, Esq., of the "Republican," on account of an offensive article in the "Republican" which resulted in the canning of the latter. A hostile meeting is anticipated between Col. Crittenden and Capt. William E. Earle, who avows himself the author of the objectionable article.
