Stonewall Jackson's Widow

Vade Bolton's Legacy of Ten Thousa Dollars-History of a Bloody Feud.

The Memphis (Tenn.) Avalanche July 30 gives a history of Wade Bolton's legacy of \$10,000 to the widow of Stonewall Jackson, as well as of the Bolton-Dickens feud, one of the darkest passages of erime in the Southwest


