THE HAYWOOD HOMICIDE

No additional particulars have been received of the homicide which was committed by Mr. Thos. Strange, in Haywood county, last week.

Strangers and in a Strange Land

Yesterday morning two men of very swarthy complexion and of singular appearance generally, arrived in this city on the North Carolina train and stopped at the Central Hotel.

They were then called into an interview with Mr. F. Ludwig, who speaks the Spanish language, and it was learned from them that they had lately landed in America and were on their way from New York to New Orleans.

They had bought tickets, and left last night on the Air-Line train. They sat in the office of the Central Hotel all day, not even speaking to each other, except at long intervals.

They were well dressed and were evidently of the better class. They registered as F. Martinez y Illada and F. Martinez y Rodriguez.

They were attending burglary.

Deputy Constable A. R. Brown, of Steel Creek, on yesterday brought to this city and had confined in jail, a negro man named Randolph Sutton, who, a few nights ago, attempted to break into the store of Mr. Chas C. Cooper, at Randallburg, in Steel Creek Township.

Mr. Cooper, who sleeps in the store, was awakened some time during the night by the noise of boring, and got up, pistol in hand. He could see the man, and concluding that he could make a more successful shot with a shot gun, got one and awaited until the man began to climb in the window.

He then fired upon him, when he fell back to the ground and escaped. He has been hiding ever since, until day before yesterday, when he was caught. It was found that the whole load of shot had lodged in his side, inflicting a painful and dangerous wound.

Sutton is not considered out of danger as yet, and is now under the treatment of the county physician, Dr E C Alexander.

Attempt at Burglary

On Tuesday night an attempt was made by a thief to enter the residence of Mr. B. Koopmann on Church street, between Sixth and Seventh streets.
