The First Bale of New Cotton.

The bale of new cotton of this year's growth, from the farm of Hugh M. Parks, Esq., of Providence, Mecklenburg county, arrived on Friday and was sold yesterday to Stenhouse, Macaulay & Co., at 16 1/2; weight 400 lbs. It classed as strict middling, and the staple was very good. This enterprising and very successful farmer sold the first bale of the season last year, also to the same firm at 17 1/2 on Sept. 8; weight 437, classed middling. "The first fruits of the season" have fallen for a long series of years past to our friends, the Messrs Stenhouse, Macaulay & Co. We erred yesterday, in saying that Col. Bryce bought the first bale last year.

Hoosier Mosaics.

It is the production of Maurice Thompson, and is composed, as its name implies, of fragmentary stories of life in the Hoosier State. 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Work on College Street.

Committed to Jail.

Last evening about dark, two country prisoners landed in jail. One of these was a white man named John Gordon, committed by Justice M. L. Wallis for obtaining goods under false pretences; the other a negro named Isaac Reid, for tearing a sack of flour from Stuard's mill, about 6 miles from the city, on Friday night.

Gene to the Convention.

Gen Rufus Barringer and Dr W M Kerr, left last night for Raleigh, where the Constitutional Convention, to which they are delegates, meets to-morrow. Capt. Plato Durham, delegate from Cleveland, Caleb Motz, Esq., delegate from Lincoln, and Jonas Hoffman, Esq., delegate from Gaston, also passed through, en route to Raleigh.

Shipment of the First Bale.

The great Atlantic Coast Line, with its usual readiness to serve the merchants of Charlotte, takes via the Charlotte, Columbia & Augusta Railroad, this morning, to New York, free, the first bale of the new crop of cotton, received at Charlotte. This bale will be pushed forward by passenger trains, and will reach New York on Wednesday morning, the 8th inst.

Personal.

We have had the pleasure of meeting Mr. W. R. French, who is now traveling in the interest of that able and wide-awake paper, the Wilmington Star. We are glad to know that he has canvassed Charlotte to some purpose.

Gen. Haupt, of the Piedmont Air-Line, Col. Fremont, of the Carolina Central, John D. Williams, Jr, of Fayetteville, and J. T. DeLane, of the Lincoln Progress, were among the arrivals at the Central Hotel on yesterday.

Resisting an Officer with a Pistol.

Yesterday Constable Whitley had a warrant for the arrest of a negro named Burwell Edwards, charged with larceny. The officer found him under a house in "Logtown," a negro settlement south of the Charlotte, Columbia & Augusta Railroad, and after getting him out, produced his warrant and began to read it to him. While thus engaged, the negro, who was standing close by his side, drew his pistol, and placing the muzzle close to his breast, pulled the trigger. Most fortunately the pistol snapped, otherwise Mr Whitley would almost certainly have been killed. The negro then took to his heels and the Constable pursued. The former wheeled and fired, but the officer still following him, he continued to run. During the chase he turned and fired three times at Mr Whitley and once at Prince Brown, colored, who accompanied the latter. None of the shots took effect, however. The thief escaped, and has not yet been captured.

Railroad Magnates in Conclave.

A meeting of quite a number of railroad magnates, was held yesterday at the Central Hotel. The meeting was for the purpose of establishing standard rates on cotton by three of the leading lines running out from this city, to be in force during the coming season. The Charlotte, Columbia & Augusta Railroad and its connections, was represented by Maj A Pope; the Richmond & Danville and its connections, by Capt John R Macmurdo, and the Carolina Central, and its connections, by Capt F W Clarke. The meeting, before it adjourned, established the following schedule of rates: From Charlotte to Wilmington, \$1.60 per bale; from Charlotte to Richmond, \$2; to Norfolk, \$2.25; to Charleston, \$1.75; to Baltimore, \$2.85; to New York and Philadelphia, \$3.80; to Boston and Providence \$4.00. These will be the standard weights, and will be in force from and after to-morrow, the 6th inst.

Superior Court.

The Court was occupied again, yesterday, with the civil docket. The only case of general interest, was that of S B Alexander et al, vs Wm Johnston et al, bondsmen of the late A C Williamson, Clerk and Master in Equity. The jury found the issues submitted in favor of the plaintiffs. This amount involved was about \$2,000.

The verdict of the jury in the case of W S Brown and wife, vs W M Johnston et al, which case was tried on Friday, was in favor of the plaintiffs. The verdict was for the sum of \$100 each. Their bondsmen, Wm B McDonald, James H. Brown and Alfred Hawthorn, if they do not appear to-morrow at 9 o'clock in the afternoon, will be heard. Judge Schenck and Solicitor Montgomery will open the Sabbath at their respective homes. No jury will be needed until 9 a. m. on Tuesday, at which time the civil docket will be resumed. There are a large number of cases on both the State and civil dockets, which have not yet been touched.
