Deadly Affray in Polk County.

From Capt J C Mills, who has just returned from Polk, we learn the particulars of a general fight which occurred in that county some days ago, between two sets of negro laborers employed on the Spartanburg & Asheville Railroad, the hands in the employ of contractors Clayton and Fagg. There had been a feud existing between them for some time past, and on the day in question, meeting at a certain point, a row ensued. Pistols, sticks and rocks were used freely. About fifteen shots were fired. One of the Fagg negroes was shot and killed, another was stabled through the wrist, and several of each of the contending parties, were more or less injured. A number of the combatants were arrested and lodged in jail at Columbus.
