THE CITY

City Bulletin.
New moon, visible for the last night for two, this morning.

Fine red, juicy apples, now adorn the grocery stores.
Yesterday was real warm - warm for winter clothes and comfort.

Note changes in the schedule of the Carolina Central Railroad.
The Board of Aldermen will meet on Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Mr R E Miller, of this city, has been appointed one of the Marshals of the approaching Fair at Salisbury. He is also a director of the Association.

Messrs J.S. Phillips and E.J. Allen, have moved into their new store on Trade street, under the recent addition to the Central Hotel.

The Richmond Depot proponent John Templeton's troops, which will play here on Thursday night, the best of his kind that has occupied the theatre of this city in two years.

The meeting for the re-organization of the Richmond & Danville Railroad, was adjourned to take place in Richmond next week. The fight between Haupt and Talcott, for the general superintendency, continues.

Another Match Game.
Next Saturday being the Jewish Day of Atonement, when the Israelites will suspend business, the clerks of Witkovsky & Binstock have challenged those of Elias, Cohen & Rosenthal to another match game of base ball, the stake to be an oyster supper. The challenge has been accepted.

T D McAlpine, late of Raleigh, has succeeded to the position of Mr F H Phelan, of this city, as special agent, or special detective, of the internal revenue service. Mr Phelan was appointed to his office, by Dr J J Mott, the Collector of this district, and a steady effort has been made to have him ousted. It is decided, we believe, that Dr Mott has no right to the appointment of this officer, but that it devolves upon the Supervisor, and he gives the appointment to McAlpine.

A Well Managed Road.
Charlotte, Columbia and Augusta Railroad, notwithstanding the general depression in business, makes a fine showing. The gross receipts are \$18,003.89 more for August and September this year than the same months last year. The expenses \$6,543.77 less, and net receipts \$22,546.66 more for above months this than last year. This is the best evidence of good management that a corporation can produce. - *Columbia Union Herald.*

The Charlotte Merchants.
The Asheville Citizen copies an item from the Observer relative to the improvement in the trade of this city and adds: "We are glad to get such good reports from our Charlotte merchants, but it is as unexpected. New York does not contain better merchants, more prudent or accommodating. We trust that our merchants generally may foster their own State enterprises. Only in this way can the State be made to grow in prosperity and independence as the deserve."

Couldn't Publish It.
Some of our young friends came in last week with a queer "paper" tale on Bro. Caldwell of the Observer, taken from a Shelby paper. But Joseph's pen had discovered some of our young friends' frightful tales of any sort. - *Southern Home.*

We appreciate the consideration of friend Showwell in not giving further circulation to that "put up job." We will furnish him with a better item than that, before long, for the young man of "nice breeches" memory, and one with frosty hair, will keep on till they perish at our hands - die suddenly and with a great noise.

Captured After a Year.
It may be remembered that about a year ago three negroes were detected in stealing cotton from the cotton platform of this city. One of these, Dallas Orr, escaped; another was sent to the Penitentiary, and the third turned State's evidence and got off free. The authorities have had a look out for Orr, ever since, and on Sunday night he was arrested by Mr J A G Orr, who had been sent by Deputy Sheriff Farrow, at a house about 8 miles from the city, where his wife is living. He was brought here and committed to jail. He has been living in South Carolina ever since he ran away, and had only come up on a visit to his wife.

Telegraph Office, Ticket Office and Reading Room.
The room in the Central Hotel building which has until recently been used as a clothing store by Mr J S Phillips, is to be converted into an office for one of the other of the telegraph companies having lines running to this city. There will also be in it, a general ticket office, which will be in charge of Mr Kimball, now of the Air-Line Depot, who will keep on hand tickets to all points. These two offices will be in the front part of the room. About where the door leads into the office of the Central Hotel, room about 25 feet square will be cut off as a reading room for the guests of the hotel. Here the latest papers will be on file, and guests can have access to journals from nearly all the principal cities of the United States.

The whole idea is a good one - particularly that of having a telegraph office at that point, which is the centre of attraction for the city and about the most convenient point in it.

MECKLENBURG CROPS.

We are just in receipt of the Report of the Department of Agriculture, at Washington, for the month of August, and as it will be no doubt, a matter of interest to our readers, we give what the report says, of the different crops in this county.

Corn in Mecklenburg county, N.C., the report says that it is "better than for several years past." Of wheat, that it is "poor, injured by rains." Cotton, "if we have two weeks of dry weather, the crop will be as good or better than for several years past." (This was an August report.) Fruit, Apples and peaches a failure; grapes injured by rain.

UNION COURT.

In consequence of the change of schedule on the Carolina Central Railroad, Judge Schenck could not get yesterday afternoon, to open Court - day at Monroe, there being no train; and several of our citizens, lawyers and others, who had proposed going, were likewise disappointed.

Judge Schenck arrived in this city on a lumber train last evening, and leaves this morning for Monroe, where he will arrive in time to open Court.

APPLICATION FOR CONVICT LABOR.

Hon R Y McAllen left the city last night, for Raleigh, to meet with the Penitentiary Board, who, in accordance with an act of the last Legislature, are to farm out as many of the convicts, as may be left over, and after the necessary force is secured to complete the W.N.C.R. He goes in the interest of the Spartanburg and Asheville Railroad, now in process of completion, and for which he desires to employ a number of the convicts. The last mentioned road connects with his own road, the Spartanburg and Union, and to this extent he is individually interested in its completion. Col S McD Tate meets with the Board also in regard to the W.N.C.R.

SUNDAY.

The weather, Sunday, was all that could have been desired. It was a splendid specimen of this glorious Autumn season, when we are just midway between the heat of Summer and the cold of Winter, when nature gives evidence that portions of the same still remain, while it gives at the same time, unmistakable evidence of the near approach of the second. The heat was just great enough to be genial as it tempered the coolness, and the sunlight and the pleasant temperature which it induced, were attractions which drew as many to church, as did the feeling of devotion in the hearts of the men and women of Charlotte.

The churches were all attended by full congregations, and in all where services were held, the regular pastors filled the pulpits. In the Lutheran and Second Presbyterian, there were no services, the pastor of the latter being absent, and there being no regular pastor of the Lutheran.

The size of all the congregations in attendance showed no diminution in the number of worshippers.

THE GAME BETWEEN THE K 9 AND RED BELTS.

A splendid game of baseball was played in this city, yesterday afternoon, between the K 9 of this city and the Red Belts of Sharon. There was some of the prettiest playing on both sides ever seen here. When the game had progressed as far as the fourth inning, the Red Belts were a long distance ahead, when the K 9 coming to the bat, white-washed their adversaries three innings in succession. Pulling up nearly even, the game was close during its remainder, and at the conclusion of the ninth inning, the two sides were tied, standing 17 to 17. Another inning was decided upon and the Red Belts going to the bat, made 5 runs. The K 9 on this inning made only one run, and the contest thus closed, resulting in victory for the Red Belts, the score showing 22 to 18 - which score shows an unusually fine game.

The most brilliant fielding was done by Ernest Young, of the K 9, he having made two double plays. The fielding on both sides was excellent, the batting so-so, some times being very good and again very inferior. We congratulate our "country cousins" upon the result. They played hard and well for victory, and deserved it.

THE COURTS.

MAYOR'S COURT - Jonathan Res was before the Mayor, yesterday morning, for making a disturbance, and was fined \$10 and cost.

Mack Torrence, colored, was up for emptying filth in the street, and was fined \$1 and cost.

BEFORE JUSTICE DAVIDSON - J R Kirkpatrick, upon the allegation of The Salmon, a Magistrate in Sharon, that Kirkpatrick had committed an assault upon him in this city, yesterday, striking him twice. The defendant was fined \$10 and costs, and bound over in a bond of \$500 to keep the peace. This case will be heard this morning before the Mayor, also, the assault being a breach of a city ordinance.

BEFORE JUSTICE McMINOR - B F Tipton, on the complaint of G L Gibson, charging him with false arrest. Justice S H Hilton set on this case with Justice McMiner. Messrs Vance and Bailey appeared for the plaintiff and Geo E Wilson for the defendant. The Court after hearing the case, withheld its judgment until next Monday. There are three other similar charges against the same party, but it is expected that the decision in this case will decide at least one of the remaining cases.

CHANGE OF THE CAROLINA CENTRAL.

Henceforth the Carolina Central Railroad will be conducted at two divisions, that is to say as it was before the schedule which has just ceased, went into effect. The train which arrives here in the morning at 8, will change conductors, engines and engineers - Capt. Kenneth Finch will have his old trip, that is from Charlotte to the head of the road, running up each morning and returning in the afternoon. The conductors who arrive in the morning, will lay over at Charlotte instead of at Shelby. It need not be supposed from this that through passengers will have to change cars; here, or through freight break bulk; such is not the case.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

The Board met at the Court House in Charlotte on yesterday. Present, W E Ardrey, chairman, T L Yall, Thomas Gloyd, B L DeArmond, and H M Dixon.

The following was the only business of importance:

It was ordered by the Board that Jno O Alexander, J P, W Griffin and H H Peoples, be a committee to have the repairs done McAlpine's creek bridge, on the Providence road, that they deem necessary, and report.

Ordered by the Board that the Trustee of Clear Creek be allowed to rent the property assessed for building the fence around the Township, and be allowed to levy a tax on the poll.

Ordered by the Board that the expenses of heating the new jail be defrayed by the county.

Ordered that the Building Committee be authorized to let out the contract for enclosing the new jail.

Ordered by the Board that E DeArmond and H M Dixon be continued as committee on Poor House, and T L Yall and Thomas Gloyd as committee on Public Buildings.

The application of Dr T J Moore and others for the county to inclose the road known as Irwin's lane, near the city, was refused on the grounds that the Board have no authority in the matter.

Ordered by the Board that T L Yall examine the report of County Treasurer. The unreported business consisted of orders for the payment of small sums of money for different purposes.

A SUNDAY AFTERNOON ADVENTURE.

There was not a drop of spirits aboard, but notwithstanding this a more convivial party never forgot to "Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy," than the six young men who mounted a carriage in this city, on Sunday afternoon last, and started out on a ride. They are chaps who must have fun, and if they can't find enough during the week, they will trespass upon the Sabbath for it. As the carriage rattled over the road, mirth and laughter ruled the party, and peals of merriment rang through the woods. About five miles from town, the horses' heads were turned from the main road into a narrow wagon way, by which it was hoped to reach another road and enter the city from another direction.

Blissful contentedness had succeeded a burst of laughter, and each one had given himself up to enjoyment of the refreshing ride. "How much better this is," exclaimed one, "than passing this sacred day in sleep. I was about to go to bed when I met you all, and how unfortunate it would have been if I had done so." Then the young man who had insisted upon holding the ribbons, said: "I never go into the woods on this blessed 'Sabbath' day, and feel the hush that has fallen upon nature, without reflecting that - h-ll: there goes the wheel!" and before he got any further "there went" two of the party into the ditch - billed shirts, pig hats, and all.

"Great Caesar's ghost!" exclaimed one, "and I've got an engagement for church to night." "And so have I," said another. "Then I wanted to make one," said a third. Then they all set their hands on their hips, and looked at the crushed wheel. Each fell then cursed the driver, and driver and all cursed their luck. But clothing themselves with curses did nothing toward repairing the damage, and hunted up a blacksmith shop in the woods, three with coats off, filled their hands with tar and had them baked, in the attempt to get the hub of the axle, while one sat on the ground and examined his circus ticket and directed the others what to do, while they abused him for his laziness and snubbed him the balance of the day.

A wheel was found. The crowd around the carriage was apprised of this by hearing it as it rumbled down the road, and by the war-whoop of the limb of the law who followed it, with banner on the back of his head, running along the top of his speed in a vain effort to keep it from getting out of his sight. Then came more tar on hands, and more bark off, and more dirt on store clothes in the effort to put the wheel on. This effort was partially accomplished; the wheel went on the enough to hold up the carriage, but not far enough to hold up the young men. So while the young man who had at the start "insisted upon holding the ribbons," walked along by the side of the lame wheel and watched it while he held the ribbons, the remainder of the crowd fell in behind - trudging, single file up the dusty road on the way back to town.

Some remarks which were intended to be sarcastic, were made at this time, about "how fortunate it was that somebody didn't go to sleep," and about "what a sacred quiet hung over all nature on this blessed Sabbath; but such observations were treated with the contempt which they deserved.

The crowd reached the city by dark. The two young men who had engagements, fulfilled them; and as they sat with banquets countenances and listened to the preached word, the tar on their hands and the absence of skin therefrom, were concealed by elegantly fitting gloves.

As the young man whose father owns the carriage, told the blacksmith who fixed the wheel yesterday, to call on his father and he would settle with him, he added with a ghastly grin, "and that's what she gets for my taking Sunday rides."
