CITY BUSINESS. There was hardly a streak of sunshine during all of yesterday.

Between 900 and 1,000 bales of cotton were moved, day before yesterday, on the Charlotte Division of the Charlotte, Columbia & Augusta Railroad.

Howes' Great London Circus, which exhibits here to-morrow, is at Spartanburg today.

Traders From Afar Off. Two or three days ago, country merchants from the following counties were in the store of Whitkovsky & Rintels, of this city, all laying in stocks at the same time: Cherokee, Clay, Mitchell, McDowell, Gaston, Cleveland, Cabarrus, Anson and Richmond.

What is known as the Longear property, now the Central Saloon, adjoining the Central Hotel and fronting 27 feet on Tryon street and running back 195, was sold yesterday at the Court House door by C. F. Harrison, auctioneer, by virtue of a decree of the Superior Court.

The Air Line Civil Rights Case. We see it stated in the Spartanburg Herald that on Thursday last, the conductor, Capt. D. P. Gandler, mail agent A. A. Hammet, and Jerry Davis, baggage men, the parties for whom warrants had been issued, for ejecting negroes from the train, about ten days ago, because they persisted in occupying seats in the ladies' coach on the Air Line Railroad, went over to Spartanburg and voluntarily submitted to an investigation before United States Commissioner P. H. Ervin and J. S. R. Thomson.

He professes that he hasn't been following this show around, but it is certain that he came here with it from up the Carolina Central Railroad, had been with it for some days past, and left with it last night.

For the quality of the cheer, commend us to the agent of Howes' Circus who brought up the rear of Cole's procession in a two-horse buggy yesterday morning. He was doing better than the rest of Cole's wagons, and as the procession moved through the streets, he threw out Howes' billiard ball, exclaiming at the same time, "Wait for the big show, Saturday, October 16th!"

He followed the procession all around town, distributing bills and bidding the crowd with till Saturday, and still they didn't kill him.

Minnie Marks' riding was splendid, and all the riding was above average. The menagerie is not very extensive, but the collection is good.

All in all, Cole's circus more than came up to expectations. There are many things in connection with it, of which we would like to speak, but the hour forbids. It was all that we told our readers it would be, and no one who visited it, regrets it.
