

Quite a number of firemen, section masters, track laborers and others, employees of the Carolina Central Railway Company, on yesterday sued the company, some before Justice McNinch and others before Justice Davidson for wages due them for several months | past. Justice Mc-Ninch granted about a dozen judgments against the company, Justice Davidson four or five, and a number were postponed for hearing at a future time. The officers and agents of the company acknowledged the claims of the laborers, but appealed from the judgment in each case.


