First Race—Club purse \$150; \$50 to second horse. One and half mile dash. Weight for age. A dash of 3 of a mile. For all ages, with one hundred pounds on each.

SECOND DAY—Thursday, Nov. 18.

First Race—Club purse \$125; \$25 to second horse. Mile dash.

THIRD DAY—Friday, Nov. 19.

First Race—Cochrane purse—1 1/2 mile dash. \$125 added by W R Cochrane. \$25 to second horse.

SECOND RACE—Charlotte Hotel stakes—half mile heats. \$10 entrance, P. P. \$150 added by Charlotte Hotel. \$50 to second horse.

THIRD RACE—Consolation purse, \$150—\$50 to the second horse—one mile dash. For horses that have run and not won first money. Those beaten once, allowed 7 pounds; twice, 12 and three times 18 pounds.
