

Every religion that has ever been introduced there, has attained a greater or less degree of popularity. In the sixteenth century the Roman Catholic religion was introduced there, and there were many converts to it. To such an extent did it flourish that the Emperor himself and his family embraced it, as did also hundreds and thousands of his subjects. Their original belief is far from being satisfactory to themselves. Voodouism, as has been said, "is derided by the high, decried by the low, and followed by all." Hence, they are ready for anything which promises them greater peace of mind, and our missionaries now live in peace and are doing successful work in places where once they were persecuted and driven from city to city.

Another consideration which appeals to us to aid the missionary work in this land, is the fact of our relations with the Chinese. They are immigrating to this country in large numbers, and in this view of the case their evangelization is a matter of concern to us. In China there are now about 200 Protestant missionaries and as many native workers, and the number of converts is about 10,000. Of these missionaries, one, Mr Davis, is from North Carolina, (Rev John N Davis, of Salisbury); another, Mr Dubois, is from South Carolina, and there is a lady missionary from Georgia. Female workers are much the most effective, rendered so by the rules of society which create certain barriers between the sexes. In addition to the churches, there are what are called street chapels n the cities -rooms on the streets where the missionaries preach and where a crowd of natives will assemble, prompted by curiosity. The same motive induces them to follow the missionaries around from place to place and thus the Gospel is spread among the people.
