FOREIGN

Destructive Explosion—Selling Without License—Failure—Subjugation of Kholand Confirmed—Heavy Flood.

LONDON, March 3.—The tow Little Bolo, on the gold coast of Africa, has been half burned up. Two thousand kegs of powder burst in one house, and fifty natives were blown to pieces while plundering the burning and abandoned houses in the city.

Count McCarty, agent of H. May & Co., Boston, has been found guilty of selling without license, and fined twenty dollars and cost. He appealed.

Thomson & Randall, commission merchants, have failed.

BERLIN, March 2.—The subjugation of Kholand by Russia, is confirmed. This leaves only 226 miles between the Russian and British quarters in Central Asia.

PARIS, March 3.—The inhabitants of Assaires have been driven from their homes by the flooded Seine.

BOLOGNE, March 3.—Don Carlos has deferred his departure for England until half past two to-morrow afternoon.

WASHINGTON.

Silliman Denies—Robeson Discharging Belknap's Duties—Belknap Close at Home—The Articles of Impeachment Being Drawn—The Impeachment Committee at Work, &c.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 3.—Professor Silliman has written that he is surprised at the mendacity of Lyon's statements. He makes a general denial, and demands an exhaustive examination.

Secretary Robeson this morning entered upon his additional duties as acting Secretary of War. He will merely attend to the routine business until the vacancy shall be filled. His hour at the War Department for the reception of members of Congress, is from half past 9 to 10 o'clock, and at the Navy Department from half past 10 to noon.

Mr. Belknap has not left his home since yesterday, and meantime has been called on by a few intimate friends.

The Judiciary Committee have commenced the preparation of the articles of impeachment. They meet again this afternoon, but will probably not report the charges to-day.

The Committee on Privileges and Elections have agreed to report the resolution referred to them for counting the electoral vote without amendment.

House.—The committee to report the impeachment proceedings to the Senate, have just started for that purpose. The Senate has up the Pinchback case, and Edmunds is speaking in opposition to his admission.

MARINE.

Ship Ashore—Loss of Life Off the North Carolina Coast.

WASHINGTON, March 3.—The Signal Service Observer at Tybe Island, reports a ship on Stone Horse Shoals, three miles South East of the station, at 7 o'clock this morning.

The Signal Service Observer at Kitic Hawk, on the North Carolina coast, reports this morning an Italian bark, name unknown, in ballast, bound from some point in Italy to Baltimore, having come ashore twenty miles North of that station on the night of March 1st. She went to pieces yesterday, and the crew, consisting of 13 men, were all lost, excepting 4, who were picked up yesterday. A lifesaving crew attempted to board the bark and every man was drowned. Six ladies have been recovered and nine are still missing.

MARYLAND.

Railroad Stock Liable to Taxation.

BALTIMORE, March 3.—The Court of Appeals has decided that the capital stock of the Northern Central Railroad Company is liable to assessment and State taxation. This brings under taxation millions heretofore exempt.

Mid-Night Dispatches.

WASHINGTON.

Belknap impeached at the Bar of the Senate—The Pinchback Case—Debate on Pinchback, &c., &c.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 3.—The House Judiciary Committee have permission to print the Finna Mine testimony.

Clymer, of Pennsylvania, Chairman of the committee, made the following report: "In obedience to the order of the House, we proceeded to the bar of the Senate, and in the name of this House, and of all the people of the United States of America, we impeached, as we were directed to do, William W. Belknap, late Secretary of War of the United States, of high crime and misdemeanors while in office; and we demanded that the Senate shall take order to make him appear before that body to answer for the same, and announced that the House would soon present articles of impeachment and make them good, to which the response was made. Order shall be taken."

The telegraph, orders and correspondence relating to the Military Court of Inquiry for General Babcock, has been ordered.

The political disabilities of Wm. L. Murray, have been moved. Debate to-morrow. Adjourned.

SENATE.—The galleries were filled to-day.

Bills: By Hamlin, fixing the vote of third class mail matter, and for other purposes.

By Robertson, to restore the franking privilege.

Morton reported, and gave notice that he would call up on an early day, a bill counting the votes for President and Vice-President.

Maxey presented a memorial of the Choctaw, Seminole and other Indians, remonstrating against the organization of the territory occupied by them into a territory of the United States.

Resolutions, appropriating \$15,000 from the contingent fund to the Spencer investigation were adopted.

Pinchback was resumed. Edmunds spoke in opposition, Morton replying, said that from the beginning this question had been governed by political considerations, and he proposed before the case was concluded, to speak of it in its political aspects and consequences, and he would do so fearlessly.

Frelinghuysen spoke in favor of Pinchback.

Bruce, of Mississippi, spoke in favor of seating Mr. Pinchback. He said when he entered upon the discharge of his duties in the Senate, the question had already been elaborately discussed, and it was not necessary for him to make any extended remarks. He believed that what ever seeming irregularities might be attached to the manner in which the will of the people in Louisiana was ascertained, Pinchback had a majority of the legal votes and was entitled to his seat in the Senate. If the Senate should refuse to admit Pinchback, it would be an admission that the Legislature which elected him and which had been making laws for the people, was a mob. Louisiana was entitled to full representation on this floor, and the Senate could not ignore its obligations to give to that State a full representation. Whatever wrongs had been done in Louisiana, the present order of things in that State had been accepted by the nation and by the people of the State; he thought Pinchback should be admitted in the interest of good will and good government. He then spoke of the personal qualities of Pinchback, and said he knew him to be an affectionate husband and as a citizen loyal and brave.

As the select committee to consider the resolution of the House in regard to the impeachment of Wm W Belknap late Secretary of War, Messrs. Edmunds, of Vermont, Conkling, of New York, Frelinghuysen, of New Jersey, Thurman, of Ohio, and Stevenson, of Kentucky.

Executive session. Adjourned to Monday. Confirmation: Robt. M. Wallace, Marshal for South Carolina.

FOREIGN.

Condition of the Liverpool Cotton Market.

LIVERPOOL, March 3.—The Liverpool Cotton Brokers' Circular, issued last evening, after the close of business, says that the market has been depressed throughout the week and through to-day. On Thursday, the tone was slightly quieter. Quotations of every description show a further decline. American descriptions continue to be very freely offered, and a further decline has taken place of 1/4 in medium, and a farthing in ordinary qualities; but good middling and middling fair grade are unchanged. In Sea Island cotton, business has again been very limited, but the price is unchanged. Business has been moderate in futures, and quotations about 1/4 below last week.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Plea for the Repeal of the Resumption Act.

BOSTON, March 3.—The Board of Trade has unanimously adopted resolutions urging Congress not to repeal the law of '73, and prescribing a measure by which resumption in '79 may be made operative.

WASHINGTON, March 3.

For the South Atlantic and East Gulf States, falling barometer, north-east to southeast winds, warmer, clear or partly cloudy weather will prevail during Sunday.
