Mr. Cheek's wagon was in company with half a dozen others, his being the last wagon in the train.

On Saturday night last, between 9 and 10 o'clock, an incendiary attempt was made to burn the liquor store and bar-room of J. Alfred Carroll, in Yorkville. The fire broke into a large blaze, but was checked by some colored men who were passing and saw it. Three United States soldiers one of whom had been elected from the bar-room that afternoon, were suspected, arrested and imprisoned.
