Noon Dispatches. WASHINGTON.

Too Strong for Bristow—A Score of Investigations Proceeding, Schenck's Among Others—Waite Waited on to Administer the Oath—Congressional Proceedings, &c.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 5.—Gossip: A World special says that Secretary Cameron and the President are too strong for Bristow.

Gen. Merrill denies Custer's statement that he took a bribe while Judge Advocate in Texas.

The Foreign Committee with probably two exceptions, declare that Schenck did reprehensible acts in becoming a director and speculator in Emma Mine, but was not guilty of intentional dishonesty.

SENATE—Edmunson and Thurman were appointed as a committee to wait upon the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court and invite him to attend in the Senate at 1 p. m. to-day and administer the impeachment oath to the Senators.

HOUSE.—The Committee on Banking and Currency made their first report of the season, by a bill regulating National Bank receivers.

Result of Municipal Elections in Various Places—Democratic Gains in Both Branches of the Connecticut Legislature.

CHICAGO, April 5.—The Republicans have carried the South and West towns; the North towns are very close.

ST. LOUIS, April 5.—The municipal election, yesterday, resulted in a majority for the Democrats and Independents.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., April 5.—At the municipal election, yesterday, the vote was probably the largest ever polled here.

TOPEKA, April 5.—At the city election, yesterday, the Republicans elected their Mayor and probably all of their city ticket.

HARTFORD, April 5.—Total vote 98,485, against 100,983 last year. Result this year—Robinson, 49,556; Ingersoll, 51,071; Smith, 1,871. Senate, 18 Democrats and 4 Republicans; the Democrats gain 1. In the House, 149 Democrats, 85 Republicans; 2 Independents. The Democrats gain 22. Democratic majority on joint ballot, 87.

Mid-Night Dispatches.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES. WASHINGTON, April 5.

For the South Atlantic and Gulf States, rising barometer, cooler North and West winds, partly cloudy and clear weather will prevail.

WASHINGTON, April 5.—Bristow is in Kentucky for his health, and remains for some time.

Twenty per cent. of the clerks in the Treasurer's office will be discharged on account of short appropriations.

Taft refers applicants for post traderships to the commandants of the posts for endorsement.

The Finance Committee of the Senate is discussing the silver bill. Strong opposition to resumption is manifested. Its passage without amendment is improbable.

Bristow paid the editor of a commercial paper in St. Louis, who had excellent opportunities to obtain information of whiskey frauds, and shortly after appointed him special agent. He had received a good deal of valuable information from newspaper men, but had not paid them a dollar with the above exception, and none had asked him for pay.

In the War Department investigation, Chandler corroborated the statement recently telegraphed regarding Bell. L. A. Barnes told Chandler that Bell had been in Babcock's service.

Before the Privileges and Elections Committee, General Morgan made a motion to have the evidence ruled out as immaterial and irrelevant.

SENATE.—The bill authorizing the payment of the Alabama Commission judgments, passed and goes to the President. A bill authorizing the sale of the Pawnee Indian reservation, passed, and goes to the President.

HOUSE.—The Secretary of the Treasury is directed to furnish an itemized account of the \$300,000 for light and fuel for the year ending June 30th, '76.

The bill to regulate the winding up of National Banks passed. Cox explained that its object was to enable insolvent banks to speedily close up their accounts in the interest of the public.

After a conference to-day between Taft and Sherman, they visited the President. Previous to this, Congressman Banning, Chairman of the Military Affairs Committee of the House, had a conference with Taft.
