Noon Dispatches.

WASHINGTON.

Babcock's Evidence Regarding Bell—Writ Served on Belknap—Investigating the New York Post Office—Evidence in the Spencer Case—Testimony Against Purman—Emma Mine Again.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 7.—Babcock's evidence: Saw Bell first at headquarters seeking employment as a detective. Heard of him next when Luckey returned from St. Louis.

The Sergeant-at-Arms of the Senate to-day served a writ on Belknap, who was cheerful and talkative. He said that only one side had been heard.

Postmaster Cochrane, of Selma, defers to the Elections and Privileges Committee, and repeats his story before the Alabama Commission that there was no bargain between him and Spencer.

Purman quoted before the Committee on Civil Service, that his election cost him six thousand dollars, and he was going to get some of it back; some old fellow wanted a cadetship for his son, and if he got it, would have to pay for it.

The Foreign Committee have not decided whether to confine the investigation of Emma Mine to Schenck's connection with it.

FOREIGN.

Miners Struck—Election Annulled—Sick Minister.

LONDON, April 7.—Five thousand coal miners in North Derbyshire have struck.

VERSAILLES, April 7.—The Deputies have annulled the election of D. Omani, the Bonapartist from Chaire.

FLASHES.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 7.—The Pacific mail steamship City of Panama, has been attached on a suit by the Panama Railroad Company.

TRENTON, N. J., April 7.—Ex-Gov. Chas. R. Olden, is dead.

CINCINNATI, April 7.—The general managers of a number of railroads are in session here arranging general rates of freight with a view of abolishing the commissions.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, April 7.

For the South Atlantic States, cooler, northerly winds veering to easterly, partly cloudy weather, slight changes in pressure will prevail.

WASHINGTON.

Spencer Continued—The Post Office and Bell Investigations—House Proceedings—Kilbourn Put on Com. on Ratons, &c.

WASHINGTON, April 7.—Jewell, Britton and Robeson were absent from the Cabinet to-day.

In the Spencer investigation, M. G. Cander testified that he knew of no corrupt practices in electing Spencer. H. R. Myers testified that he secured the appointment of Moulton as postmaster at Mobile, against Spencer's wish.

HOUSE.—It was a private bill day. The Committee on Military Affairs, to allow Gen. Godfrey Wetzel to accept the office of Trustee of the Cincinnati Southern Railroad Company, provided that it do not interfere with the performance of his official duties in the army.

Reservation. Debate only to-morrow. Adjourned.

In the postoffice investigation, notes were produced, showing that Sawyer had paid Wm. H. Farrow \$30,000 on the 6th June, '72, and to J. J. Hinds, \$7,500, with a memorandum in Sawyer's handwriting, that this was only half the Hinds party got from the El Paso stage company.

Thos. B. Connerly in charge of the New York Herald, was before Clymer's committee on the subject of Bell. His testimony was that he knew Bell, had a conversation with him, but declined to answer the questions until he had a consultation with Mr. Bennett, for which purpose the committee gave him leave of absence till Tuesday.

The Sergeant-at-Arms of the House sent a note to the Warden of the jail, ordering him to furnish Hallet Kilbourn meals at a cost not to exceed a dollar per day, and charge the same to the House of Representatives.

VIRGINIA.

Postponement of the Application for a Receiver for the A. M. & O. Railroad.

RICHMOND, April 7.—The case in the United States Circuit Court involving the application of certain bondholders for the appointment of a receiver for the Atlantic, Mississippi & Ohio Railroad, was to-day postponed by Judge Bond and Hughes till Tuesday, 2d of May.

Judge W. D. Shipman, of New York, of counsel for the foreign bondholders, asked for the postponement for the non-arrival of Mr. Collison, agent of the foreign bondholders who, Judge Shipman stated, would probably reconcile certain difficulties that it was apprehended would arise in the progress of the case between the Atlantic, Mississippi & Ohio Railroad bondholders, and the holders of the divisional bonds and thereby clear away what might otherwise be a fruitful source of embarrassment in the future progress of the case.

Other counsel were present as follows: Henry T. Wickham, counsel for the foreign bondholders; Maj. Charles Stringfellow, and Judge William J. Robertson, counsel for Gen. Mahone; Judge W. W. Crump, counsel on the part of the divisional trustees; L. R. Page, counsel for the Virginia and Tennessee trustees; Judge Scarborough, counsel for the city of Norfolk; Drewry Hinton, counsel for the city of Petersburg; E. S. Brown, counsel for the city of Lynchburg; Raleigh T. Daniel, Attorney General, representing the Board of Public Works.

FOREIGN.

Extradition Cases—Commitment for Mutiny—English Imports—A Steamship Captain Found Guilty.

LONDON, April 7.—It is believed that the same rule will be applied to the case of Gray, of New York, and Brent, of Louisville, forgers, that governs in the Winslow case.

Setting is 3 1/2 to 1 in favor of Cambridge. Eight of the crew of the ship Lennig, have been committed for trial on the charge of mutiny and murder.

The Board of Trade returns for March show, as compared with the corresponding months of '74 and '75, a decline of 10 and 4 per cent, respectively in the value of exports, and 8 and 10 per cent respectively in the value of imports. The grain trade for the week has been dull and somewhat depressed. The Continental trade was quiet.

Captain Kahn, of the Franconia, which sunk the Strath Clyde, has been convicted of manslaughter. Sentence waits the decision of the Court of Appeals on question of jurisdiction.

ILLINOIS.

A Trusted Man Absconds.

CHICAGO, April 7.—Frank Cambias, a member of the Board of Trade, withdrew his account from the Bank and absconded, leaving over a half million bushels of wheat unpaid for. Cambias has been a bull and bought largely during the recent rise. His loss on the whole amount is 2 to 3 cents per bushel. The members who lost have been obliged to throw a large amount of wheat on the market, occasioning a rapid decline.

NEW YORK.

Investigating Whiskey Houses—Quarters for Our Royal Visitors.

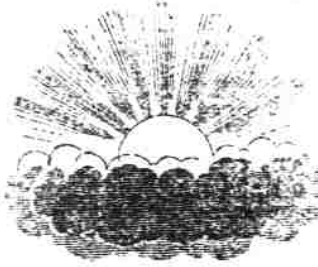
NEW YORK, April 7.—The Grand Jury is investigating the transactions of large whiskey and rectifying establishments. It is stated that the indictments will astonish business circles here.

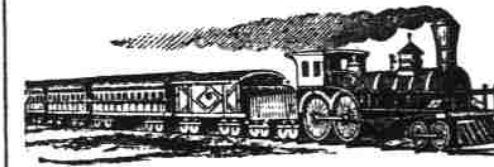
