WASHINGTON.

Fish Firm on the Winslow Question—Habeas Corpus for Kilburn—Can Such a Writ Reach the House?—The Silver Bill Passed Both Houses—The Work on the Jetties—Carpenter for Purman—Writ Served on Officers of the House.
WASHINGTON, D. C., April 11.—Fish takes decided ground, and informs Hoffman, in charge of affairs at London, that the United States cannot, under circumstances, take cognizance of the act of the British Parliament of 70, touching extradition treaties. He peremptorily refuses to give any assurance that Winslow shall not be tried for any offense except that for which extradition is asked.
Judge Carter has issued a writ of habeas corpus for Hallett Kilburn, returnable forthwith.
In the case of Pat Woods, held by the House for assailing Congressman Porter, the late Reverdy Johnson was consulted. His opinion was that the House of Representatives was a court of such judicature that a habeas corpus could not reach it.
The Appropriations Committee have concurred in the Senate amendments to the silver bill as telegraphed last night, but have added three hundred thousand to the appropriations for the printing and engraving bureau, which if concurred in by the House, will carry it back to the Senate.
In the Senate the Chair presented a communication from the Secretary of War, enclosing a communication from Maj. C. B. Comstock, showing the progress made by Jas. B. Eads, in the improvement of the South Pass of the Mississippi River, up to February 7th, 1876; referred to the Committee on Commerce.
The Committee on Appropriations finally adopted the silver bill precisely as it came from the Senate, and will report it to the House.
This morning Matt Carpenter appeared for Purman, of Florida. There has yet been no proof of money passing.
The Appropriation Committee struck out the provision taxing tea and coffee, and it remained on the free list.
The officer of the court has served a writ on the Sergeant-at-Arms and Speaker.

NEW YORK.
Committee for Purchasing the C & O Railroad—A New Embezzlement Discovered—Stewart's Funeral on Thursday.
NEW YORK, April 11.—The following is the committee for purchasing and reorganizing the Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad Company: C B Huntington, A A Low, Jno Casters, A S Hattel and Isaac Davenport. The plan of Fish & Hatch has been adopted.
While the Receiver of the Security Bank was engaged last week in paying the first dividend to depositors, he discovered that the book keeper and teller, John Seal, who had been in the employ of the bank since 1872, had embezzled funds to the extent of \$70,000 and fled to escape arrest. This will result in a further loss to the depositors of fifteen per cent. Seal had been embezzling this money from the time of his appointment.
The funeral of the late A. T. Stewart, takes place on Thursday morning next at 11 o'clock, from St. Mark's Episcopal Church. Bishop Potter will officiate.

MARYLAND.

Demurrs Sustained in Election Cases.
BALTIMORE, April 11.—In the United States Circuit Court, yesterday, Judge Giles sustained the demurrs in all of the election cases under the enforcement act, and ordered the acquittal of those indicted. The demurrers were on the grounds that the enforcement act was neither appropriate nor constitutional legislation under the constitution and its amendments. Judge Giles sustained the demurrs in pursuance of the decision of the Supreme Court of the United States in the recently decided cases of Hiram Reese and Matthews Tousey. Fifty-six persons were indicted by the Grand Jury in the United States Court for violations of the enforcement act at the State election in November last, and all were acquitted.

MISSOURI.

May Bring Babcock Up Again—Great Rejoicing Over a Court Decision.
St. Louis, April 11.—Dyer says if the point raised in the McKee case is sustained, he will commence proceedings against Babcock in the original indictment.
Osage, April 11.—The people are all over the Supreme Court decision, which secures in their homes three thousand families. Three hundred guns were fired, the bells are ringing and bonfires are blazing.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

The Republican Convention—Turbulent Times—Gov Chamberlain's Crowd Whipped Out.
COLUMBIA, S. C., April 12.—The morning session of the State Republican Convention was turbulent and exciting. There are two distinct parties in that body, one of them led by Gov. Chamberlain, and consists of those who sincerely support his reform policy and are not jealous of his strength and popularity; the other party is led by United States Senator Patterson, who has at his back Collector Worthington, of Charleston, Congressman Smalls, ex-Congressman Elliott, and most of the Republicans who were conspicuous as rulers of the party before Governor Chamberlain's election. Each of the parties desired to control the Convention, and that would carry with it a majority of the delegates to the National Convention, and also probably the control of the State nominating Convention to be held hereafter. FOREIGN.

Specie Increase—French Senate Adjourned—Another Election Annulled—A Franco-American Operatic Festival.
BERLIN, April 12.—Specie decrease, 44,300,000 marks.
PARIS, April 12.—The Senate has adjourned to May 10th. The Deputies have annulled the election of Reuber, from Ajaccio, in consequence of a letter from the Prince Imperial opposing the candidature of Prince Napoleon.
The Franco-American Union has organized a grand operatic festival for April 24th; the proceeds to be devoted to a monument to be erected in New York harbor. The musical societies of Paris, and its expected several provincial societies, will take part in the festival. The programme contains a cantata specially composed for the occasion by Gouning.

MARINE.

Steamship Schedule—Repairing the Cable.
LIVERPOOL, April 11.—The White Star and Inman steamers have agreed to dispatch their steamers between this port and New York on alternate Thursdays.
PORTSMOUTH, N. H., April 11.—The steamer Faraday is here and expects to repair the direct cable in twelve hours.

WASHINGTON.
Supreme Court Decision—Gone to New York—Avery Before a Committee—The Safe Burglary—No Notice Paid to Carlton's Writ, &c.
WASHINGTON, D. C., April 11.—Supreme Court: The Board of Liquidation of the State of Louisiana, et al., appellants, vs. H S McComb; appeal from the Circuit Court of the United States for the District of Louisiana. Justice Bradley delivered the opinion of the Court affirming the decree of said Circuit Court so far as it prohibits the funding of the debt due to the Louisiana Levee Company and the consolidation bonds issued or to be issued under the funding act of January 24th, 1874, and revising said decree as to so much thereof as prohibits the issue of any other bonds to the Louisiana Levee Company in liquidation of its debts, costs to be paid by appellants. Justice Field did not set in this case, and took no part in the decision.
The Appropriations Committee voted to non-concur in the Senate amendments to the Consular and Diplomatic Bill and ask for its confirmation.
No Southern nominations.

any county sent two sets of delegates, all should be excluded. The debate grew very hot. Judge Mackey, one of the delegates, denounced the anti-Chamberlain party as a band of robbers and told ex-Congressman Elliott who asked whom he meant, that he (Elliott) was the head and front of those robbers. Elliott drew a pistol and sought to get to Mackey, who awaited him. Desks and chairs were overturned, and excited delegates gathered around Mackey and dragged them apart. A chair was brandished over Gov Chamberlain's head by an opposition delegate. No blows passed, and when the Convention had calmed down, a little chairman, ex-Congressman Whittemore, ruled out the contesting delegates, all of whom were supporters of Chamberlain. Swails, a colored State Senator, and Governor Chamberlain were nominated for President pro tem, and the vote was eighty for Swails and forty for Chamberlain. A committee on credentials, mainly made up of the anti-Chamberlain party, was then appointed and the Convention adjourned to 7 o'clock p. m.

NEW YORK.

Stewart's Business—Pres ents to Colleges.
NEW YORK, April 12.—Both of Stewart's stores remained closed until Saturday except for banking and necessary book-keeping purposes. Business will be resumed Saturday as usual under the direction of Judge Hilton and Mr Libby. Judge Hilton remarked that there were seven thousand persons on the pay roll of the firm, and that a sudden stoppage of such a business would be a great calamity.
