Noon Dispatches.

NORTH CAROLINA

The Raleigh News Company Acquitted of Libel, RALEIGH, April 21.—John D. Cameron, editor of the Raleigh Daily News, and Clark Blackhall, and other stockholders of News Publishing Company, indicted for libel in charging Josiah Turner, Jr., with attempting to pay off Matthew Atwater, a candidate for the last Convention from Orange county, with promise of his per diem, that he (Turner) might become a candidate, were tried yesterday before Judge Henry. The defendants justified by proving the truth of the charge, and the jury, after a few minutes consultation among themselves, returned a verdict of not guilty.

NEBRASKA

The Democrats in Favor of Tilden. AMAHA, April 20.—The Democratic State Convention held at Lincoln yesterday, was the largest and most influential ever held in the State. Resolutions for hard money and reform were adopted with unanimity. Two-thirds of the Convention favored the nomination of Gov. Tilden for President, but no formal expression was given to this preference. The delegates were chosen to the National Convention. The delegates are known to be for Tilden unanimously.

WASHINGTON

Grant Excited—He Denies the Charges —The Cabinet Called Together—Taft Cutting Down—More Unearthing to be Done—The Prof Collecting Against Babcock—Statement from the Agricultural Department.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 21.—A World special says the President is not disposed to be as indifferent to the charges against him as some of his supporters. He was thoroughly aroused and excited to-day, and in general terms denounced the statement made by ex-Attorney General Williams as untrue. He says he has no recollection of Williams calling on him to disburse the money for Davenport's use, to be a different matter and that he has been deceived. The President has further resolved on a full investigation of the charge, and has desired to take the advice of the Cabinet in the premises. For that purpose he has sent a personal request to each member to meet to-morrow at 11 o'clock for a special consultation on the subject.

It has been decided that Belknap drew his pay up to the 21 of March as Secretary of War. Bristow replies to the committee that the law gives him discretion as to the manner of selling bonds. He thought the sum of half a million best, and did not propose to change it. Taft is cutting down Belknap's estimates five or six million.

A Times special says there are the most astounding rumors now afloat as to the future use to which Whitley is to be put in the matter of the investigation. It is said among other things, that he will go before many investigations committees. Whitley's friends show that he himself was a member of the ring, and he will then tell a story implicating prominent parties and produce letters and documents to show conclusively the guilt of Babcock. There is also to be shown through the agency of Whitley or somebody else, that the President's name has been used in an unauthorized way if not indeed actually forged to documents by Babcock.

All the seeds at the Agricultural Department have been disposed of except a few that have been reserved for Northern sections, which as yet have received none. The demand has been and is still very great. Much complaint has been made by correspondent applicants, for seed, that letters have not been answered. The daily receipt of letters is so great, often amounting to a thousand, that the force of the Department is inadequate to answer all. In all cases where letters are such as require an answer, such is made without delay.

BOSTON, April 21.—Jackson H. Frothingham, formerly Chief Clerk of the Stamp Department of the post office, has been convicted of stealing \$2,500. St. Louis, April 21.—Wm Cooper to-day shot a fellow servant, Mollie Deal Dean, and himself, both fatally. Mollie refused to marry William.

C. Harrison, of this city, will go before the Judiciary Committee of the House and the Government Director of the road, and demand an immediate investigation of the matter.

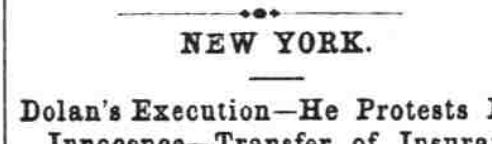
