NEW YORK, April 27 .- A dispatch dated Brownsville, 25th, says the reyolutionists moved out of Matemoras this morning, 1,000 strong, under command of Diaz, en route for Montery. Gen Gonselles remains in command. A great many desertions from the National Guard is taking place, the deserters escaping to this side of the river. Last night a squad of cavalry remained in the saddle for the purpose of enforcing the neutrality laws, it having been reported that contrabands of war would be crossed the river for Diaz. They are doing their best to prevent it. The movement of Diaz is regarded as little more than the usual outbreak that takes place in Mexico during the Presidential election, and it is not anticipated that any fighting will take place here.

A band of counterfeiters were arrested at Ringgold barracks yesterday. Affairs in Camargo, on the opposite side of the river from that place, are reported quiet.
