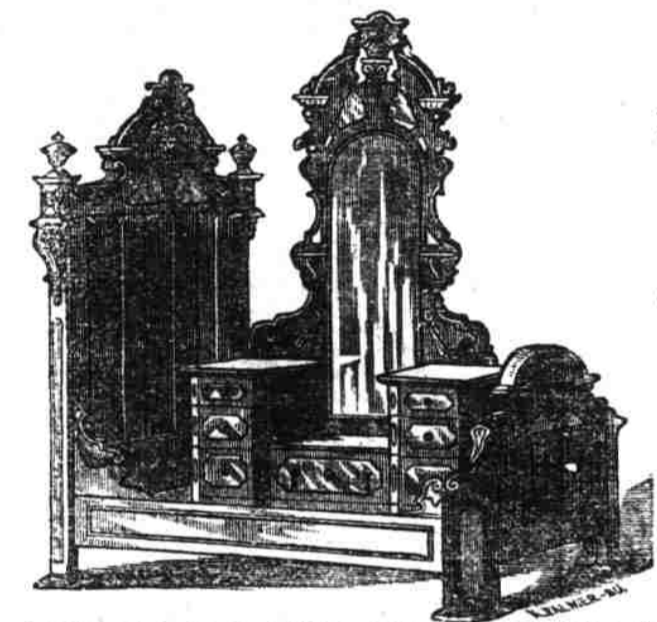

Noon Dispatches.

WASHINGTON.

Now They Tackle Conkling—The Delinquent Tax List—Congress Going to the Centennial.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 5.—A special to the World says the agent of the Yale Lock Company and the Hall Safe Lock Company, charges Senator Conkling with having had a tool of his appointed one of the board of four examiners in the Patent Office, whose duty it is to examine into the value of all patents in the Lock Department; that this tool kept Conkling posted as to all that was done and said by the examiners; that Conkling argued the case of a client before the examiners, and that the commission decided in favor of Conkling's client, and against all other lock companies.

The House passed a joint resolution directing that the delinquent tax list which was awarded to the Republican, be published at the Government Printing Office.

The Senate adopted the House resolution accepting the invitation to attend the opening of the Centennial Exhibition at Philadelphia, and providing for adjournment from Tuesday the 9th to Friday the 12th.

OHIO.

Decisions in Turf Cases—Factory Burned.

CLEVELAND, May 5.—The Board of Appeals of the National Trotting Association heard, yesterday, all the cases upon the docket that were represented. The most important case was that of Goldsmith Maid vs. The Southern Ohio Fair Association, which was decided against the Maid, the Board holding that trotting for a purse for exhibition of speed does not constitute a race.

A wooden-ware factory was burned to-day. Loss, \$150,000; insurance, \$70,000.

GEORGIA.

The Republican Delegates to Cincinnati—No Governor Nominated.

ATLANTA, May 5.—The Republican State Convention adjourned last night at midnight, after a two days session. The delegates at large to the Cincinnati Convention are: H. P. Farrow, H. M. Turner (colored), and Geo. Wallace, (colored). The delegation is estimated to stand: Morton, 5; Bristol, 6; Conkling, 4; and Blaine, 8. There are thirteen white and nine colored delegates. The Convention endorsed the administration of Gen. Grant, and adjourned without nominating a Governor or electoral ticket.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Suspensions of Mills.

SPRINGFIELD, May 5.—Harney, Arnold & Co., of the North Adams Print Works have failed, involving the closing of six mills. Liabilities over a million. Assets, mostly unsaleable property, costing about a million and a half. The mills run, in all, over 1,000 looms. 800 people are thrown out of employment.

PENNSYLVANIA.

Centennial Liquor and Dead Head Passes.

PHILADELPHIA, May 5.—The Centennial Commissioners' lawyers have decided that the prohibitory liquor laws are suspended so far as the centennial grounds are affected.

Passes for the opening ceremonies on May 10th, will be furnished all duly certified journalists on and after May 6th, at the office of the Department of the Press, 904 Walnut street.

FLASHES.

SOMERSET, PA., May 5.—Two hotels and five stores have been burned here. Loss \$200,000.

NEW YORK, May 5.—Hugh J Jewett's annual report as receiver of the Erie Road, May '75 to June '76, shows the handling of nearly seventeen million dollars.

NASHVILLE, May 5.—Plenty won the mile heats, 1.45, 1.46. Vanderbilt won the mile and an eighth dash, 2.02. Grey Steel won the mile and a half dash, 2.43.

MARYLAND.

The Republican Delegates to go for Blaine.

FREDRICK, May 5.—The resolutions of the Republican Convention, speak of Grant's administration as wise, patriotic and prudent, and pledge the vote of the State to Blaine. They instruct the delegates to vote for him as long as there is hope.

WASHINGTON, May 5.

For the South Atlantic States, falling followed by rising and stationary barometer, southwest to southeast winds, slightly warmer and clear or partly cloudy weather will prevail.

WASHINGTON.

Morton in His Seat—Bruce at the White House—The Naval Appropriation—The Impeachment Proceedings—Cadets Passed and Rejected—The Declaration to go to Philadelphia.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 5.—Morton is in his seat to-day. Bruce was at the White House to-day for the first time since his denunciation of the President in executive session.

Hewitt and Parkes, are the sub-committee on Foreign Affairs to write the Schenck report.

Davenport, as attorney for the Union League worked for the passage of the enforcement acts of '70, the act to amend them, and the act to amend the naturalization laws.

No Southern nominations or confirmations.

HOUSE.—A resolution was adopted appropriating \$4,500 for the better ventilation of the House. Sixty odd private bills were passed.

The Naval Appropriation Bill reported embraces nearly 13 millions. It contains a provision looking to the sale of the naval hospitals at Annapolis, Md., and Washington, and directs them to be closed during the next fiscal year. It contains a provision looking to the sale of the navy yards at Charleston, Washington and Pensacola, and to the recession of the naval station at New London, and directs the establishment of a naval rendezvous at Tybee Island or at Cock's, in Georgia. It orders the stoppage of enlistments in the navy, until the number of men is reduced to 5,000.

SENATE.—The chair submitted reports of Lieut Col L. A Gilmore, of the corps of engineers, in regard to the importance of improving the channel at the entrance of the Cumberland, and deepening the inside passage between Cumberland and St Simon's Sound, Georgia. The Committee on Commerce and the Committee on Foreign Relations, reported favorably on House bill authorizing the President to appoint two Centennial Commissioners in lieu of those acting from Texas, and asked present consideration. Hamilton objected.

IMPEACHMENT: Carpenter would endeavor to show: First, that articles of impeachment could not be entertained against a private citizen in any case whatever; Second, the articles of impeachment exhibited must form every fact essential to constitute a crime impeachable. Knott, of Kentucky, followed in behalf of the managers, but had not concluded when the Senate went into executive session and adjourned.

The following were rejected by the academic board, appointment vacant by this examination: Second District of North Carolina; Second and Fourth of Arkansas; Second of Mississippi; First of Tennessee; the 6th and 4th of Virginia failed to report.

Jno W Powell, of Mississippi, by direction of MC Ball, chief clerk of the Interior Department, leaves to-morrow with the original Declaration of Independence, and will deliver it to Col Frank Etting, at Philadelphia for exhibition in Independence Hall during the entire centennial.

MISSOURI.

Meeting of Freight Agents—The Whiskey Cases.

ST. LOUIS, May 5.—A number of freight agents, representing Southern roads, who have been in session here three days, have agreed to re-adopt the rates from St. Louis, Indianapolis, Chicago and Cincinnati, to points in Georgia, Alabama, South Carolina and other States known as the Green Line points which were in effect in December last. There are also representatives here of several Eastern and Northern roads, for the purpose of

fixing the summer schedules, but they have reached no conclusion as yet.

Dyer has proved sentence upon the grangers and store-keepers who had pleaded guilty.
