**Noon Dispatches.**

**FOREIGN.**

**Outrage Upon a United States Consul—Reparation Promised to Germany—Cuban News.**

PARIS, May 8.—From details of the outrage at Salonica received here, it appears that the United States Consul interfered for the protection of a Greek girl who was the innocent cause of a disturbance, and conducted her to the consulate in a carriage. An excited mob thereupon surrounded the consulate and the French and German Consuls who were brothers-in-law, and both related by marriage to the American Consul, believing him to be in danger, proceeded to his assistance, and on the way thither were attacked. The Italian Consul informed the Governor of the state of affairs, and he sent troops to the relief of the American Consul which was besieged by the rabble.

LONDON, May 9.—A special dispatch from Berlin to the *Pall Mall Gazette* says: "Germany has accepted the Part's offer to give satisfaction for the Salonica outrage, provided the promises be carried into effect immediately. The approaching conference between Prince Gortschakoff, Count Andrassey and Prince Bismarck, will be held at the latter's official residence."

HAVANA, May 9.—Senator Sosa Canora del Castello, has been appointed Director General of Finances for Cuba, vice Senator Vigil.

Moderate rains have fallen throughout the island.

**NEW YORK.**

**A Horse Car Accident—Connection with Europe Restored—Rubenstein Dead—The Late Tunnel Explosion.**

NEW YORK, May 9.—A horse car fell from the elevator at Hoboken, last night, by a false start, and two were killed.

Communication with Europe by the Anglo-American cable, is now restored.

There were 27 passengers on the street car which fell from the elevator at Jersey City Heights last night. None were killed outright. Four received injuries which may prove fatal. Eight or ten others were hurt, the most of them seriously, but not dangerously. The cause of the accident is attributed to the carelessness of the truckman, who rang the bell for the engineer to go ahead before the car had passed safely on the track.

Pesach N Rubenstein, the condemned murderer of the Jewess, Sarah Alexander, died this morning at 10 o'clock in his cell at Raymond street jail, Brooklyn. The cause of his death was general debility.

The contractor of Bergin Tunnel, when the explosion took place Saturday night, says he saw 12 or 13 tunnel men come from the direction of Hoboken on Saturday night and go up the "Hundred Steps." After they reached the top of the hill, he heard the report of a pistol and soon after, the explosion occurred. He did not dare to go out, as he was afraid of his life on account of the strikers. He stated that the iron door of the magazine was found in the Elysian fields two miles distant, yesterday evening.

**WASHINGTON.**

**All Hands Gone to the Centennial.**

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 9.—Both Houses adjourned without business. The entire Legislative, Judicial and Executive Departments have gone to the Centennial. There have been no committees in session. Everything adjourned to Friday.

**WEATHER IRREGULARITIES.**

**WASHINGTON, May 9.**

For the South Atlantic and East Gulf States, during Wednesday, rising followed by stationary or falling barometer, cool northwest winds, backing to warmer southerly, and clear weather will prevail.

**FOREIGN.**

**The Celebrated Walking Match—Vaughan the Winner.**

LONDON, May 9.—The iron plated war ship *Temeraire* has been successfully launched.

For the twenty-four hours walking match, for \$5,000, fourteen English pedestrians contested. Mr Miles made fifty miles in eight hours and forty-eight minutes and twenty-eight seconds; Foster second. Mr Vaughan is regarded as probable winner. He completed ninety-nine miles in eighteen hours and forty-one minutes and twenty seconds.

LATER.—Vaughan completed one hundred miles, beating O'Leary's time two minutes and five seconds.

**WASHINGTON.**

**Change of Terminus of the Texas Pacific Railroad—Large Number of Southern Railroad Ticket Sellers en route for the Centennial—Another Charge Against Bristow—Impeachment and What it Sets Forth.**

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 9.—Ex-Congressman Smith of Louisiana, who leaves for home to-night, reports that the members of the Senate and House Committees on railroads have agreed to report that the eastern terminus of the Texas Pacific R. R. shall be changed to Vicksburg. On the North, the Louisiana R. R. shall be subsidized as Vicksburg branch. The railroad ticket sellers of the South reached here this morning, en route to Philadelphia to attend the opening ceremonies of the Centennial Exposition as guests of Col Foreachers, on the Virginia Midland route. Nearly every Southern city is represented in the party which is under charge of W. D. Chipley, General Southern agent of the line. The party breakfasted this morning at the relay station by invitation of the Baltimore & Ohio R. R.

The *Star* says Secretary Bristow is already the target of the slander circulators. It is now charged that he suspended proceedings against John Buckner, who was Collector of Internal Revenue at Louisville, and defaulted to the extent of \$100,000, because Mr Miles, the foster father of Mrs Bristow, who died recently, leaving Mrs Bristow a handsome legacy is on the bond of the defaulter, and to proceed against him would involve the estate. It is further said that the matter has been quietly investigated by the Ways and Means Committee. The impeachment presented against Belknap sets forth that he was Secretary of War, on June 16th, 1873, at which time, a certain question, matter, cause, or proceeding, was pending in relation to the appointment and retention in office of the Trader at Fort Sill, in the Indian Territory. That he did unlawfully and corruptly accept and receive the sum of \$1,700, from one Caleb P. Marsh, with intent to the question pending, influenced, and did appoint one John S. Evans as Post Trader, in consideration of having received said sum.

**NEW YORK.**

**Investigations by Naval Committee—Examination of Roach, Ship Builder and Contractor—Nothing Important Elicited—More Whisky Indictments—Vigilance Committee in Existence in Brooklyn.**

NEW YORK, May 9.—The sub-committee of Naval Expenditures, which is in session at the Astor House, examined John Roach, ship builder and contractor. The examination continued six hours. Roach gave a detailed account of his transactions with the government during the past ten years. He denies having improperly influenced officials. He claimed that all his transactions were fair and above board. He had paid political assessments once; contributed to the election of Gov. Hoffman; and gave in this way about as much to one party as the other.

The Brooklyn Superintendent of Police was notified to-day that a vigilance committee had been organized in that city to hunt up burglars and murderers. The Committee styles itself LaFayette Tribe Company No. 1 of the city of Brooklyn, organized the eighteenth of September, 1869. The police are hunting the matter up.

The Grand Jury of the criminal branch of the United States Court presented thirty indictments; most of which it is understood are against crooked whiskey men of high standing. Warrants will be served to-morrow, when details will transpire.

**FLASHES.**

BOSTON, May 9.—Anna Dickinson's appearance in her play, "Crown of Thorns," is a success.

ST. LOUIS, May 9.—The river has risen unusually rapid, and is still swelling an inch and a half per hour. The levee is nearly submerged in two places.

LEXINGTON, May 9.—In the mile and an eighth race for 3 year olds, Vagrant won, 156½. Half mile, for 2 year olds, fillies, Lyle & Scullie's filly, by Hartington, won. In the 2½ mile race, Misdale won, 1:43½.

PLYMOUTH, May 9.—The Gothe is repaired and has sailed to New York.

BOSTON, May 9.—The Supreme Court decides that Old South Church can be sold, and that the ten hour law is constitutional.

LOWELL, Mass., May 9.—A portion of the Merrimac Print Works will suspend for a few days, owing to an over-stock in certain departments.

MILFORD, Pa., May 9.—The rain last night extinguished the forest fires which had already destroyed thousands of acres in Pike county.

CHICAGO, May 9.—Mr. Hayne was qualified as mayor of Chicago, this morning, and was duly sworn in. No further steps towards getting possession have as yet taken place.

**CONNECTICUT.**

**Fire in a Theatre—Remarkable Self-Possession of an Actor.**

BRIDGEPORT, May 9.—During Barry Sullivan's performance of Richard the Third, dense smoke rolled from the stage. The panic was arrested by the actor crying that the fire was out—smoke increased—play stopped, and the audience found the way safely down the narrow stair case from the second story. The fire was in the basement of the adjoining building.
