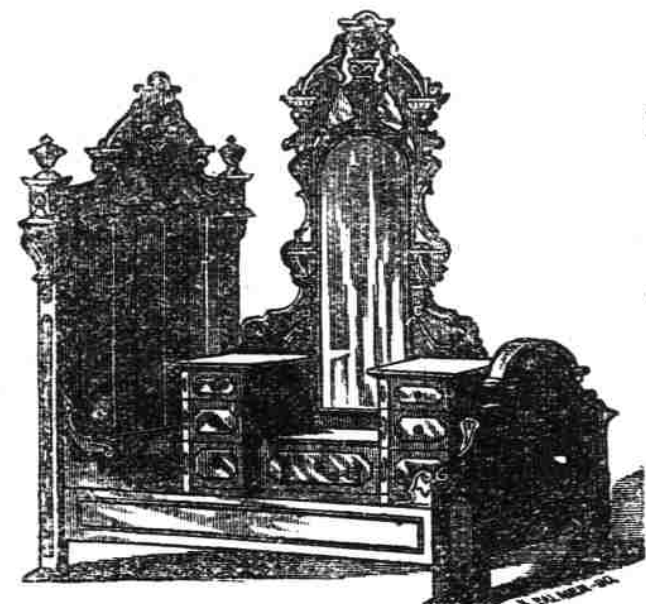

Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

The Salonica Outrage Believed to Have Been Planned—What Reparation Germany Demands—Wales at Home—Critical Situation in Turkey.

LONDON, May 10.—An Odessa dispatch represents the Salonica outrage as premeditated. All the Consuls except the British had warned the Governor and Porte that a massacre was intended.

The Bulgarian insurrection gains ground. The insurgents hold Billova, and a portion of the Roumelian Railroad.

A Paris dispatch says the inter- change of views at Berlin on the Salonica affair, resulted in a collective demand by the powers for the execution of the murderers and indemnity to their families, solemn salute to the French and German flags, and guar- antees against similar massacres.

The Serapis, with the Prince of Wales on board, together with the royal yacht Osborne and the steam frigate Raleigh, passed Hurst Castle at 11.50 o'clock this morning.

The Daily Telegraph, in an editorial says: "If we are not mistaken, the English ambassador at Constantinople has informed the government that the situation is critical. A violent out- break, of which christians will become the victims, may occur at any mo- ment, throughout Turkey, and even in Constantinople. We would not be surprised, therefore, if the English Mediterranean squadron were ordered immediately to Beseker Bay, at the mouth of the Hellespont, the same as on the eve of the Crimean war.

A special dispatch to the Post, from Berlin, says it is understood that Count Andrasassy, the Austrian Premier, has expressed views strongly ad- verse to Austrian armed intervention in the Turkish complications.

RAG MONEY.

The Greenback Conventions of Two States.

DES MOINES, IOWA, May 11.—The State Greenback Convention met here yester- day; the usual greenback platform was adopted, and delegates elected to the National Convention at Indian- apolis.

MILWAUKEE, WIS., May 11.—The In- dependent Greenback Convention chose delegates to the National Con- vention at Indianapolis. Among the resolutions adopted was one in nomi- nation of Judge Davis for President.

Protection Asked Against John.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 11.—A dispatch from Victoria, B C, says a resolution passed the House without debate de- claring it expedient that the govern- ment take steps to prevent the prov- ince from being overrun by Chinese to the injury of the white population.

FLASHES.

ST. LOUIS, May 11.—McKee and Ma- guire have a week further stay of judg- ment.

The river is receding slowly.

HARTFORD, May 11.—In the Demo- cratic legislative caucus, Barnum stood 100, English 74, Ingersoll 1. Barnum was then nominated by acclamation.

WOODVILLE, N. H., May 11.—All the passenger trains stopped on account of the flood. Farmers along Connecti- cut river are suffering.

PHILADELPHIA, May 11.—Thirty thousand persons at the Centennial to- day. Weather dusty.

ANNAPOLIS, May 11.—The steamer Tallapoosa is hard aground on Bluff Point bar, off Naval Academy.

THOMASTON, CONN., May 11.—A de- tached track threw a passenger train down a nine foot embankment, into the river. The water, five feet deep, checked the shock. None killed. Twenty hurt.

ST. LOUIS, May 11.—Over a hundred railroad and steamboat company's agreed to carry passengers to the De- mocratic Convention at half rates.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 11.—The report that Senator Thurman will make an argument in the Belknap case against the jurisdiction of the Senate, is unfounded.

NEW YORK.

Death of Reddy, the Blacksmith, and of Dr. Hall.

NEW YORK, May 11.—Wm Varley, known as "Reddy, the Blacksmith," died to-day of consumption.

Dr. Wm W Hall, of Hall's Journal of Health, fell in the street to-day, and died in a few minutes. He was aged 63. The cause of his death is un- known.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, May 11.

For the South Atlantic and Gulf States, falling barometer, warmer, southeasterly to southwest winds, increas- ing to fresh and brisk winds and increas- ing cloudiness will prevail, possibly fol- lowed by rain areas in the West Gulf States.

FOREIGN.

Derby Answers—Duel—The Kind of Man He Is—The Plague in Bagdad.

LONDON, May 11.—Derby answered Fish's letter of March 31st, on Satur- day.

The Post says that Prince Alexander Auresberg and Count Leopold Kalouvat fought a duel at Prague on Friday. The Prince was shot in the chest. Con- sidered dangerous.

PARIS, May 11.—Specie increased 15 1/2 million francs.

M Demapy, Radical, has been elect- ed deputy from Ile De Lavignon. At the opening of the session of the Chamber of Deputies a Versailles book- seller, named Rastoun, cried out from the gallery: "In the name of God and Joan of Arc, live Napoleon the Fourth; down with the Gambettists and Or- leanists!" He was arrested amid con- siderable confusion. A majority, how- ever, considering the episode as a freak of insanity, and one appearing be- fore the questor, Rastoun said: "I have fulfilled my duty; you can do what you like with me." He was released.

LONDON, May 11.—Advices from Bag- dad states that from the 16th to the 22d of April, the number of deaths from the plague was 336. At Hillap, during the same period, there were 159 deaths from the same disease.

(NOTE.—It adds to Salonica interest, that it is the Salonica of the New Testa- ment.

NEW JERSEY.

The Trial of the Posaic Fire Bugs.

PATTERSON, May 11.—The trial of the Posaic Fire Bugs commenced to-day in Posaic County Court. Barnacelo and White, two of the five men im- plicated, were respectively foreman and assistant foreman of the McLean Hose Company, of Posaic. An affida- vit of Spiol, one of the incendiaries, who is not on trial was read, detailing many plots for burning houses by the gang, some of which were concocted in the hose truck house, where they stored kerosene and other oil for start- ing fires. Others planned in drinking saloons of the town. White and Bar- nacelo selected the buildings to be fired. Frank Talbot, one of the accused, has turned State's evidence and gives important testimony.

NEW YORK.

Annual Meeting of the American Bible Society.

NEW YORK, May 11.—Receipts from all sources for the year were \$5,277.98. Expenditures for same period were \$5,392.81. Including balance on hand, May 1875, there still is a balance left of \$3,980. During the year 876,770 bibles were manufactured and 859,470 distributed by the society. The soci- ety have circulated the bible in twenty foreign countries during the year, and had it printed in nearly as many lan- guages. The next anniversary will be held on the 16th of May, at Philadel- phia. Nine members of the Board of Managers were elected.

VIRGINIA.

The Southern Baptist Convention.

RICHMOND, May 11.—The Southern Baptist Convention met here to-day. Dr J P Boyce, of Kentucky, presided. Drs O F Gregory, of South Carolina, and O C Bitling, of Richmond, were chosen Secretaries. After a prelimi- nary routine of business, Dr Boyce was re-elected President. The following Vice Presidents were chosen: Revs P H Mills, of Georgia, Dr J L M Curry, of Richmond, S L Anderson, of Ten- nessee, and Hiram Woods, of Mary- land.

Dr Sampson, of New York, was in- troduced and addressed the Conven- tion, explaining the difference between revival and reformation. He said Moody was a reformer and spoke in high terms of the "celebrated layman."

Dr Lorrimer, of Boston, was also in- troduced and made some interesting remarks. He spoke of the unorthodox churches of Boston, and said he be- lieved the Baptists would regain their

lost ground during the coming year.

Dr Tupper, Secretary of the Board of Foreign Missions, in his report re- presents a gratifying state in the mis- sionary work. The report of the Treas- urer of the same board shows the larg- est contribution made was by Virgin- ia, \$9,263.61. The total amount re- ceived was \$51,425.29.

The Foreign Missions will be dis- cussed to-morrow.

The report of Mr Norton, Treasurer of the Southern Baptist Convention was read and referred to a special com- mittee of five.

Dr Lorrimer of Boston, delivered the Convention sermon to-night.
