Fitzhugh Exculpated - Cumulative Evidence against Blaine, which Looks Badly for his Presidential Aspirations-Railroad Magnates at the opening of His Investigationon the Subject of Mails-Favorable Reports Regarding the Jetties.

WASHINGTON, May 15 .- Fitzhugh and his friends have presented documents which entirely exculpate him from charges of arson, theft, perjury and blackmailing, but his unfortunate letter remains and will be fatal unless a feeling that the treachery which prompted its publication should under no circumstances be successful, saves Fitzhugh. It is known that Fitzhugh could have prevented the publication for a consideration.

Congressional Proceedings-Nominations-Pierrepont Won't Act in the Whiskey Cases-Testimony Favorable to Blaine-The Louisiana Investigation.

WASHINGTON, May 15 .- SENATE .-

Withers presented resolutions of the Virginia Legislature, asking the passage of a law to refund the cotton tax; referred to the Committee on Finance. Sargent introduced a bill prohibiting any vessel bringing to the United States more than ten Chinese passengers at one trip. The Committee on Claims reported adversely on the billextending the time for presenting claims for cutton seized after June 30, '65; also adversely on the bill re-imbursing the loyal owners of the steamer Planter. The bill to extend the time to preemptors of public lands, passed. The bill confirming the sale of the Marine Hospital at Natchez, passed. The galleries were cleared and the Senate retired to consider its jurisdiction in the

impeachment. Adjourned. House .- Jones, of Kentucky, introduced a bill chartering the passenger and freight railroad from the South Atlantic Seaboard to Lake Michigan. -By Young, to refund the direct tax illegally assessed. A resolution calling on the President for the correspondence relative to the removal of John P. Henderson as special counsel, in the whiskey cases, was adopted. A resolution calling on the Secretary

of the Treasury for the names of the persons whose accounts remain unsettled since 1865, and the amounts,

was adopted. By Randall, of ennsylvania: calling on the Secretary of the Treasury for copies of all letters, telegrams, orders and instructions in prosecution of the movements against the so called whiskey rings at St. Louis, Chicago and Milwaukee. Adopted; yeas 141, nays London, May 15.—The excitement 69-a party vote. There was great exis daily increasing in Syria. Two Eng- citement. Payne moved to suspend the rules and pass the bill to exchange ten millions of silver coin for a like sum of legal tenders : failed, ayes 132, nays 73; not voting, 43.

> The bill allowing Sherman's daughter to receive her wedding present from the Khedive, free of duty, passed and goes to the President. Hoar moved to suspend the rules and declare confidence in the coretary of the Treasury's whiskey transactions, and allowing him to retain certain information from the House. Randall said the resolution reverses what the House has already done and moved to table it. Pending the vote, the District business was resumed. The charges of Albert Grant against Judge Wyley, were referred to a Select Committee of seven. Adjourned. .

Hedgeman Slack, Marshal for West Virgina. The Atterney General to-day informed the counsel for McKee and Maguire, that he will recommend that

the law take its course. In the Blaine investigation, Harrison re-affirmed his statement. Rollins swore that he heard from some one that Blaine would be involved by the investigation. He had spoken to Mr Harrison as reported, and on that account the motion to investigate had been withdrawn and had never been made. He had since been satisfied that Blaine had been wrongfully suspected. Col Scott testified this evening, prefacing with the remark that the transaction was equitable and Blaine had nothing to do with it.

Maj. Seelye was before Gen. Gibson's

Committee to-day, to investigate the Federal officers in New Orleans. He refused to testify regarding the pay rolls in the Custom House, in fear that he would criminate himself. A resolution was adopted, directing the chairman to apply to the Attorney General for a paper like that issued in the case of Whitley in the safe burglary investigation. He testified freely on other matters. Among other things he testified that there was a defalcation of \$68,000 in the New Orleans post office during Lowell's administration. Lowell had the Deputy and Cashier arrested and held in \$10,000 each and duly prosecuted. Lowell turned over his bondsmen about \$20,000 worth of property which, however, was afterwards returned him. The defalcation was finally compremised for \$7,000. Morey told the Lemonade, witness that the easiest way to settle the matter was to steal the bond, and requested the witness to do it. There were ten bondsmen who were assessed some \$2,000 each to secure the compromise. Seelye testified that Janett, then Commisssoner of the Circuit Court, gave him a warrant in Morey's District against twenty men; Morey Lemon Syrup, warrant was given Seelye for Isaac N. Glover. He had his instructions given in the presence of Janett. He was to take into the woods and kill Lemon Syrup, Glover. He was not arrested because a writ of habeas corpus was required. Seelye says he did not intend to kill Glover, but left Morey under the 'impression that he would. The infantry and cavalry in the district marched by Morey's directions. He furnished a list of his appointments and ordered troops to be at such points the day before he spoke, as he was afraid to ge without such a guard. Seelye sold to Morey his orders and telegrams for \$200 cash, and five notes of \$100 each, two of which he paid. Two were over-due and one net yet matured. Seelye retained copies. The testimony was scattering, but the witness claims that he has a memorandum by which he can tell perfectly connected stories with times, places, names and

all the details. Judge Nelson appeared for Morey, who was also present, and wished the appication for a safeguard postponed until after they had cross examined Seelye. Morey stated the evidence given showed that he Seelye should go to the penitentiary if the case should be decided by the courts, and if Seelye received a safeguard, Morey would be without the means of proving him infamous. Morey will be heard to-morrow. The committee rescinded the resolution to leave for New Orleans tomorrow. Maj Seelye was special agent of the Post Office Department at New Orleans, and afterwards elected United States Marshal.
