**Excitement Increasing in Syria—**  
**Comments of the London Times on the Conference.**  
 LONDON, May 15.—The excitement is daily increasing in Syria. Two English men-of-war have arrived at Joffa; three at Beyrout, and one English and one French at Latakia.  
 The London Times reviewing the proceedings at the conference, says: "The announcement of a complete arrangement between the three imperial powers is satisfactory, but as it appears that all plans of positive action are rejected, and that the powers are about to tender good advice again to the Sultan and the insurgents, we think it would be premature to thank the Chancellors for a settlement of the Eastern question."

**WASHINGTON.**

**Fitzhugh Exculpated—Cumulative Evidence against Blaine, which Looks Badly for his Presidential Aspirations—Railroad Magnates at the opening of His Investigation—Dom Pedro's Government and Ours on the Subject of Mails—Favorable Reports Regarding the Jetties.**  
 WASHINGTON, May 15.—Fitzhugh and his friends have presented documents which entirely exculpate him from charges of arson, theft, perjury and blackmailing, but his unfortunate letter remains and will be fatal unless a feeling that the treachery which prompted its publication should under no circumstances be successful, saves Fitzhugh. It is known that Fitzhugh could have prevented the publication for a consideration.  
 Riddle has published three columns in the *Republican*; they contain cumulative evidence that Blaine was in Steward's office and strong presumptive evidence that the late Mr. Knowlton, Riddle's son-in-law, witnessed the transfer of Bonds from Steward to Blaine, at the at the request of Steward. Blaine has been inexact in details of his explanation.  
 SENATE.—On motion of West, of La., the House passed the bill appropriating \$9,000 to pay the expenses of the Special Committee appointed to investigate Federal officers in Louisiana.  
 Parties from New York represent the feeling there regarding jetties as entirely confident.  
 Commodore Garrison who has been watching their progress with a view of placing a line of steamships between New Orleans and Brazil, has made no halt in the preparation.—Dom Pedro has been approached and there are assurances that his government will pay half of what may be necessary to carry the mail, and documents are afloat to secure a contingent contract from our government for carrying the mail.  
 Investigation of Little Rock bonds, and Blaine, opens with considerable eclat. Harrison, Reynolds, Scott and other celebrities in Railroads, are in attendance.

**Congressional Proceedings—Nominations—Fierpont Won't Act in the Whiskey Cases—Testimony Favorable to Blaine—The Louisiana Investigation.**  
 WASHINGTON, May 15.—SENATE.—Withers presented resolutions of the Virginia Legislature, asking the passage of a law to refund the cotton tax; referred to the Committee on Finance. Sargent introduced a bill prohibiting any vessel bringing to the United States more than ten Chinese passengers at one trip. The Committee on Claims reported adversely on the bill extending the time for presenting claims for cotton seized after June 30, '65; also adversely on the bill re-imbursing the loyal owners of the steamer Planter. The bill to extend the time to pre-emptors of public lands, passed. The bill confirming the sale of the Marine Hospital at Natchez, passed. The galleries were cleared and the Senate retired to consider its jurisdiction in the impeachment. Adjourned.  
 HENR.—Jones, of Kentucky, introduced a bill chartering the passenger and freight railroad from the South Atlantic Seaboard to Lake Michigan.
