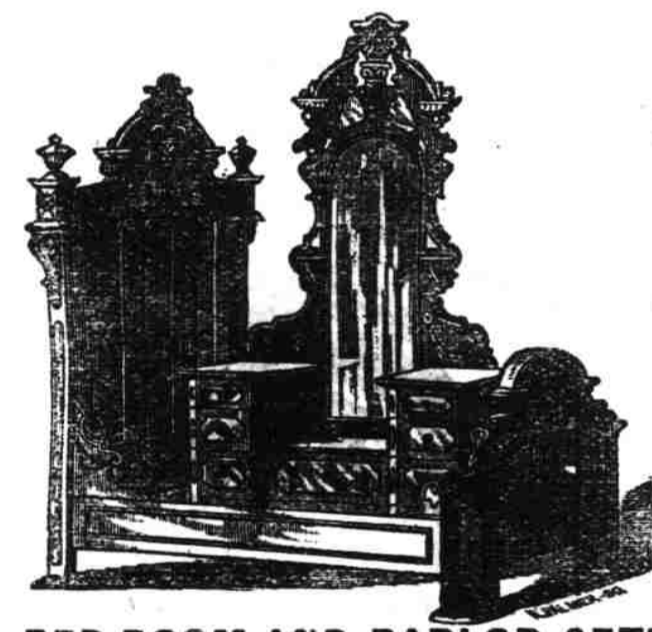

Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

Amnesty Defeated in France—Derby Satisfied with the Porte's Assurances—Honors to Wales—Another Note to be Sent to Turkey—No Further Assassinations—Failures in Buenos Ayres.

Paris, May 19.—General amnesty was defeated in the Deputies by a large majority.

London, May 19.—Derby, in the House of Lords says the Porte's efforts to punish the Salonica murderers are satisfactory. Matters at Constantinople are quieting; Derby hopes that the precautions taken may prove unnecessary.

To-day having been fixed upon by the Prince of Wales for his visit to London, after his return from India, the most elaborate preparations have been made for his entertainment. The Stock Exchanges are closed and a banquet and ball will take place this evening. The guests at the banquet number 5,000. Guild Hall where the ball takes place, is magnificently decorated. Nearly all the Princes and Princesses of royal family, Mr Disraeli and other ministers of the Government, and all the great officers of state will be present.

A dispatch to the Renter telegraph company from Berlin, says: It is believed here that England has refused or will refuse to adhere to the memorandum of the three powers—Russia, Germany and Austria. It is understood that five powers will address a note to Turkey in regard to the settlement of its affairs. The official gazette of yesterday says nothing is known in official quarters of the rumored further assassinations of Germans in Turkey. Moreover, direct telegrams from Herr Gilbert, the German consul at Pera, dated Salonica, May 16th, and the latest telegrams from the German embassy at Constantinople, do not mention the alleged assassination either of Kuhlman, the director of the Rumilian railways, which was reported, or of other German railway officials, or other German citizens living in Turkey.

Private telegrams received here from Buenos Ayres, yesterday, announced that the National bank known here as the Provincial bank of Buenos Ayres, has suspended specie payments, and numerous failures, including that of a private bank, have occurred. Argentine bonds fell heavily in consequence.

Mr Disraeli is suffering from severe cold, and cannot attend either the banquet at Guild Hall or the session of the House of Commons to-night.

WASHINGTON.

Queer Report About ex-Commissioner Douglass—Robeson Summoned to Appear and Answer—Congressional and Committee Proceedings.

WASHINGTON, May 19.—A World's special says the Committee on Expenditure, of the Treasury Department, has subpoenaed ex-Commissioner of Internal Revenue Douglass, to exculpate himself on some queer charges made against him. It is alleged that Douglass had a son in college in Pennsylvania who drew a salary of \$2,500 per annum from the government, while he was in school; also that Secretary Robeson has been notified that he may appear before the House Committee on Naval Affairs and make such answer as he can to the arraignment of his administration of the Navy Department by evidence which has thus far been taken.

The Senate is in secret session, discussing the question of jurisdiction in the Belknap impeachment case. There is no legislative business of any importance this morning.

House.—Douglass presented the Freedman Bank report; ordered printed.

In Gibson's Committee, Ferguson, when assured that it would not affect him, testified that he saw fraudulent Custom House pay rolls made up for political purposes in the campaign of 1874.

There is no immunity for Seelye yet.

The argument in the case of Lee versus Rainey, from South Carolina, has closed. The chances favor Lee.

LOUISVILLE, May 19.—Mile heats for three year olds, Red Coat won, Patriot second, Leamingtonian third; time 1.45; 1.45; 2 1/2 miles for allages, Tenbrock won, Monmouth second; time 4.02; Mile heats, 3 in 5, Grey Steel took the two first; Fair Play the three last; time 1.45; 1.44; 1.45; 1.47; 1.53. Extra 1 mile heats, Sallie Gardner won the first, and Vagabond the next two, in 1.17; 1.20.

BOWLING GREEN, May 19.—The General Assembly of Cumberland Presbyterian Church, is in session; Rev J M Wills, of Elkton, Ky., was elected moderator.

CONVENTIONS.

The Kansas Democrats Favor Hendricks—The Delaware Republicans, Blaine.

TOPEKA, KAN., May 19.—In the Democratic Convention, Ames Harris is President. The platform is: no banks issue; the government or State authorities should supply the paper currency needed, the immediate repeal of resumption. The delegates were instructed to vote for Hendricks.

DOVER, DEL., May 19.—The Republican Convention passed resolutions in regard to Blaine as the exponent of their principles. Federal office holders should not be delegates to the nominating Convention.

WASHINGTON, May 19. In the South Atlantic States, stationary or rising barometer, easterly to southerly winds, and continued warm, partly cloudy weather will prevail, with light local rains in North Carolina.

WASHINGTON.

Schenck Acquitted but Censured—Court Decision—Fish Won't Back on the Winslow Case—The Southern Troubles Ended—The Chicago Case—Congressional Doings.

WASHINGTON, May 19.—Confirmation; Annable, Pension Agent at Norfolk.

The reports on Schenck has been completed. It acquits him of intentional fraud, but censures him severely for utter impropriety, in his whole connection with Emma Mine and entire lack of perception of the proprieties of his office.

In the Supreme District Court, Collins vs. the Florida, was dismissed. The Florida was captured in a neutral port in violation of the laws of nations, and the suit was to libel her as a prize of war.

The full Cabinet considered Derby's note and unanimously decided that the note contained nothing to justify this government in changing its position on the question. Fish will answer, re-affirming the conditions of the late note. This will close the correspondence and when Winslow is released, the President will certify the facts to the Senate.

A dispatch from Augur to the Secretary of War was read, that the disturbances had ended and were mostly in Mississippi and not Louisiana. The assurance of Pierpont to Gov Kellogg that the government would render State officials, upon requisition of the Governor, such aid in a case of riot, as provided in the Constitution, were considered as covering this case entirely.

United States Marshal Campbell, of Chicago, testified that he knew nothing of the bargain between Blakely and Miss Sweet, by which money was paid. Witness, had he known, would not have been a party to it. He narrates how it was a legitimate business transaction. He had no part in attempting Miss Jewell's removal.

House.—Harrison, from the committee on Ways and Means, offered a resolution that Congress adjourn on the 12th of June; Referred.

The Committee on Expenditures in the Department of Justice, have permission to go to New York and Brooklyn. A motion to restore to the record the sharp passage between Singleton and Garfield, was tabled. Appropriations Bill was resumed. A night session was ordered. Adjourned.

The Senate was occupied with legislative business, entirely unimportant. The impeachment occupied the day. The Senate meets to-morrow. Adjourned.

GEORGIA.

Proceedings of the Presbyterian General Assembly.

SAVANNAH, May 19.—The second day's session of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, opened at 9 o'clock. Standing committees were announced. The report of the Committee on the General Presbyterian Confederation and the report of Dr. Stuart Robinson, of Louisville, delegate to the conference in London, July 21st, to form a constitution for a General Presbyterian Council, after discussion, were deferred until the opening hour to-morrow, with promise of a lively debate, on account of the diversity of views. After the reports of Foreign Missions, Sustentation and overtures were read, the question arose and excited an animated discussion, in reference to conferring overtures from the Presbyteries to Synod, except in extraordinary cases. The subjects were referred to a special committee for report during the present session of the Assembly. An important report was submitted on beneficiary education, favoring its continuance, and making valuable suggestions; referred to the educational committee. Rev W Prince, of Vicksburg, preached an interesting sermon to a large congregation to-night.
