Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

Prussian Legislation—The Sultan Sorter Cranky—Troops for Cuba—Sugar Burned—French Elections. BERLIN, May 21.—The railway bill passed its second reading in the Prussian Peers. The bill making the German language official throughout Prussia, passed its third reading in spite of the vehement opposition of the Polish Deputies. VIENNA, May 22.—The mental condition of the Sultan causes grave apprehensions. The subjects of his delusions are fearing that he will be buried alive or poisoned.

LONDON, May 22.—The Times' Madrid despatch says that thirty thousand troops are marching. The crack cavalry regiments are under orders for Cuba. They sail September 1st. A sugar house at Greenwich, with 20,000 tons of raw sugar was burned yesterday. Loss 50,000 pounds.

PARIS, May 22.—In yesterday's supplementary elections for members of the Assembly, Giroud, Republican, was returned from Melle. The reported election of David, Republican, from Auch, is incorrect. Only one member was returned from there, viz: M. Peyrouse. The Bonapartist Prince Jerome Napoleon, who was recently elected deputy from Ajaccio, has written a letter to his constituents in which he says: "The Republic exists, and patriotism imposes it upon us. I accept it loyally and unreservedly."

WASHINGTON.

Pierpont Appointed to Succeed Schenck, and Taft to Succeed Pierpont—Don't Want His Shoes—Gibson's Sub-Committee.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 22.—Nominations: Attorney General Pierpont to be Minister to England; Secretary of War Taft, to be Attorney General; Don Cameron, son of Simon, to be Secretary of War.

C E Creecy, of Mississippi, a prominent candidate for Doorkeeper before the caucus, is not a candidate to succeed Fitz Hugh. Gibson's committee's sub-committee, consisting of Riley and Darroll, have been appointed to examine the pay rolls in the Treasury Department. Judge Wilson, attorney for Casey, asked and obtained permission to accompany the committee, who are also to examine the pay rolls of December, January and February last, and investigate whether any pay rolls have been returned. Adjourned to 3 o'clock.

TENNESSEE.

A Drunken Man Suicides.

CHATTANOOGA, May 22.—Burrows, a moulder, formerly of Cleveland, Ohio, shot himself through the head last night, killing himself instantly. He had been away from work and drinking heavily for two or three weeks.

INDIAN TERRITORY.

Discouraged Miners and Hostile Indians.

NEW YORK, May 22.—A despatch dated with Col Royal's column, at Bear Spring, May 21, says the troops in moving northward, frequently meet parties of returning miners, all of them discouraged, and reporting many Indians on the road from the Black Hills. Their trail is strewn with the graves of murdered white men.

NEW JERSEY.

Damage by Hail, Wind and Rain.

NEWTON, May 22.—There was a severe hail, wind and rain storm of three hours' duration here, yesterday afternoon, causing damage to buildings, stores and gardens in town to the extent of about \$25,000, and to bridges in the county to the amount of \$20,000.

The Committee reported favorably on establishing an institution for the education of colored preachers. The matter was referred to the Educational Committee. The discussion upon the Presbyterian Council was renewed.

WASHINGTON.

Pierpont, Taft and Cameron Confirmed—Zack Denies—Clapp Complains—Barnum Seated.

WASHINGTON, May 22.—Confirmations: Pierpont, Taft and Cameron; also Andrew J Evans, Attorney for the Western District of Texas, Nathan Goff, Jr., Attorney for West Virginia, Andrew M Wheeler, Post Master at Danville, Va. Secretary Chandler disavows his intention of trying to make an impeachment case against Thompson who was Secretary of the Interior before the war. SENATE.—Barnum's credentials were presented and Barnum seated. A petition of A. M. Clapp, Congressional Printer, was presented, to the effect that he is an officer of the Senate; that great injustice has been done him by the Committee on Printing in the House of Representatives; that the books of his office are detained from him by that committee, and that no opportunity was given him for an explanation of the charges before that Committee; referred to the Committee on Privileges and Elections. A bill for the relief of C. H. Peterson, passed. Executive session. Adjourned.

HOUSE.—Kerr's leave was extended five days. Tucker presented a resolution directing the President to inform the House whether he has official information regarding violence and danger menacing American citizens in the Ottoman Empire; whether steps have been taken for the protection of such American citizens, and requesting him to take measures insure such protection; adopted. Hooker presented a joint resolution of the Mississippi Legislature, in favor of the passage of the Texas Pacific Railroad bill. Gibson introduced a resolution for the appointment of Commissioners looking to a mutually beneficial treaty with Brazil. The Committee on Rules made a long report, closing with the recapitulations first, that the office of Door-keeper be vacated by its present incumbent, and second, that the duties of Door-keeper be devolved upon the Sergeant-at-Arms until further ordered; adopted. In the Committee of the Whole on the Navy amendment by Whitthorn, largely reducing pay in the personnel of the Navy, was defeated, 72 to 74. Adjourned.
