TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

The Porte Opposed to the Scheme of the Berlin Conference—War Risks on the Mediterranean Fleet.
VIENNA, May 26.—The Turkish ambassador to Austria, at Pesth, has received a telegram announcing the Porte opposed to the scheme of the Berlin Conference.

LONDON, May 26.—There was some enquiry, yesterday at Lloyd's concerning the war risks on the vessels to the Mediterranean.
The United States ship Franklin has arrived at Salonica. Everything is quiet. The Franklin will remain a week.

CONVENTIONS.

California Democrats for Tilden—Kentucky Uninstructed—Platforms
SAN FRANCISCO, May 26.—The Democratic Convention platform is for the honest payment of the public debt, gold and silver the only legal tenders, tariff for revenue only, and prohibition of Chinese immigration. The resolutions strongly endorse Tilden; but the delegates are uninstructed beyond to vote as a unit.
Thirteen cases of small pox have developed since the arrival of the Colorado, which had it aboard.

LOUISVILLE, May 26.—In the Democratic Convention, Gen Lucius Disha was Chairman. The delegates at large are: Henry Watterson, W C P Breckenridge, Willis B Martin, and John M Rice. The platform is for the immediate and unconditional repeal of the resumption act, but regards gold and silver as the true basis of circulation. There was no declaration in favor of any candidate.

WASHINGTON.

Creswell Before the Committee—House Proceedings.
WASHINGTON, May 26.—Creswell is before the Post Office Committee explaining matters. In the House a resolution calling on the Secretary of War for the number of troops stationed in the Southern States, at what points, and for what purpose, met objection from the Republican side, and could not be entertained. The House resolution empowering the chairman of sub-committees of the New Orleans Committee to administer oaths, met objection and was not entertained.

NEW YORK.

Publication Society Receipts—Arrangements for the Hebrew Seminary Complete.
BUFFALO, May 26.—The Baptist Publication Society show the receipts of the society from all sources to be \$504,000. Five brethren were appointed to bear fraternal greeting to the Southern Baptist Convention of 77, at New Orleans.
NEW YORK, May 26.—The Hebrew Conference for the purpose of erecting a Hebrew Theological Seminary, has completed its organization, and appointed executive committees.

KENTUCKY.

Baptist Anniversary Celebration.
LOUISVILLE, May 26.—The Baptists of Kentucky celebrated yesterday, the one hundredth anniversary of the first Baptist sermon preached in the State, with interesting ceremonies, at Walnut Street church in this city. Rev. Wm Hickman was the first Baptist preacher here, and his first sermon was delivered near Harrodsburg, May 26th, 1776.

FLASHES.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., May 26.—The brig S W Collimere, from Trinidad for St. Johns, sunk to-day from a collision. The Captain's wife and two men were lost.
LOUISVILLE, May 26.—The Vanderville Theatre was burned last night. Loss \$16,000. James Love, proprietor, was badly burned and three firemen hurt. Several actors lost heavily.
SAN FRANCISCO, May 26.—Brittan's block, corner California and Davis streets, was burned. Loss \$30,000. Three men were drowned in the bay.
ST. LOUIS, May 26.—A dispatch from New Orleans reports that the steamer New Orleans went to sea through the jetties, drawing 17 feet 3 inches of water.
MEMPHIS, May 26.—S M Ellis, a prominent planter, was shot and killed to-day by Thos and Robt Reasoner, who accuse Ellis of slandering their niece. Thos surrendered himself, and Robert was arrested.
LONDON, May 26.—The painting of the Duchess of Devonshire, by Gamet-Borough, recently purchased by a firm of Bond Street, picture dealers, for \$52,500 was last night cut from the frame and stolen.

LOUISIANA.

Opposition to the Hawaiian Treaty—Bloody Affray.
NEW ORLEANS, May 26.—A large meeting of citizens interested in rice and sugar planting, was held last evening in opposition to the Hawaiian treaty. A committee was appointed to proceed to Washington and urge the defeat of the treaty.
Wm F Laroche is mortally wounded, and Matt Hagan not expected to live. Thomas Haulaham was arrested. The three had a pistol fight to-day.

PENNSYLVANIA.

An \$80,000 Fire in Tamaqua.
TAMAQUA, May 26.—Early this morning a fire broke out on Broad street. The flames originated in B Zimmerman's bakery, in the cellar of the old Union Hotel. The hotel was entirely consumed, and the fire spreading, partially destroyed Schwartz & Bros store; and Draper's shoe store, and Dorrer's furniture store were totally destroyed. The total loss was \$80,000; insurance \$45,000.

ILLINOIS.

Sale of Durham Short Horns.
CHICAGO, May 26.—The Durham lawn herd short horns, owned by Col. Robt. Holloway, of Alexis, Ill., were sold at auction, yesterday, at Dexter Park. Buyers were present from all parts of the United States and Canada, and the bidding was spirited. Sixty-five head were sold, and a total of over \$70,000 realized. The average price of cows was \$1,136; bulls \$814.

VIRGINIA.

Elections—Democrats Successful Everywhere Except in Lynchburg.
RICHMOND, May 26.—The municipal elections occurred yesterday. There were no disturbances. The Democrats were successful by over 2,000 majority. The Republicans carried Lynchburg only. The Democrats claim that their organization is perfect.

WEATHER, PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, May 26.
In the South Atlantic States, slight changes in pressure and temperature, easterly to southerly winds, and partly cloudy weather will prevail.

NEW YORK.

Train off the Track—Fraternal Message to the Southern Presbyterians.
ALBANY, May 26.—The fast mail jumped the track at West Albany, today. The fireman was killed and the engineer fatally hurt.

NEW YORK, May 16.—The Presbyterian Assembly holds its next session at Chicago. The Committee on Correspondence regarding the relations with the church South, read the following:

"The committee appointed to confer with the Presbyterian General Assembly now in session at Savannah, in reference to a basis of union between the two bodies, being unanimously and heartily in sympathy with the object which they were appointed to accomplish, and recognizing the fact that the two assemblies accept the same form of government and directory of worship,
Resolved, That this assembly reiterates its cordial desire for the establishment of fraternal relations with that Assembly on terms of perfect equality and reciprocity, as soon as it is agreeable to it to respond to this assurance by a similar expression.
The report was adopted, and it was resolved to telegraph the report and resolutions to Savannah.

WASHINGTON.

A Resume of Generally Uninteresting Matters.
WASHINGTON, D. C., May 26.—Taft and Pierpont have been interviewed. Blaine has entirely recovered. The indications are that the differences between the Senate and House on the Appropriations Bill will be very stubborn.
Of the Alabama delegation to Cincinnati Hayes is in for Blaine and Stokes for Conkling.
HOUSE—The bill for the relief of Line and Luckey, passed, the veto notwithstanding.
Patterson qualified as Doorkeeper.
The President vetoed the bill for recording deeds in the district; referred to the Judiciary Committee. The bill appropriating money for War Claims, allowed by the Commissioner of Claims, passed. Luttrell introduced a resolution reciting an article from the Baltimore Gazette, that \$300,000 had been expended by the Pacific coast to produce the passage of the Hawaiian treaty, and directing the Committee of Ways and Means to investigate it; adopted. A number of private bills passed. Adjourned.
SENATE—The Committee on Appropriations reported the Legislative Appropriations Bill with nearly all the new features put in by the House amendment, out. Executive session and the

impeachment, without result. Adjourned.
Confirmations: Seliman & Brothers, to be financial agents of the United States at London.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Piper Hung—Frost Executed—Two Men Drowned—Suit Against a Collector.
BOSTON, May 26.—Piper, the belfrey murderer, was hanged to-day. The fall caused instant death.

WORCESTER, May 26.—Sam'l J Frost was executed to-day for the murder of his wife's brother. He was calm and determined; talked politics and played checkers during his last days. The fall was so great that his head was torn from his body, the blood spurting in every direction.

GLOUCESTER, May 26.—Chas Oates and Wm Combs were drowned in the harbor to-day.

BOSTON, May 26.—Suit has been commenced against Wm Y McCartney, formerly Internal Revenue Collector, who is \$9,000 short.
