

Redeemed Notes Circulating-A Bilious Letter for Blaine's Prospects.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 27 .- A World special says testimony is about being taken showing conclusively that redeemed treasury notes which were ordered to be burned, are circulating.

The New York Sun publishes a letter dated Augusta, Me., November 25, 1870, from Jas G Blaine to Warren Fisher, of Boston, offering for \$25,000 to procure Fisher one one hundred and ninety-second part of the entire franchise of the Northern Pacific Railroad, including land and company's stock. After a description of the prospective profits of the transaction Blaine says he cannot avail himself of the opportunity, and following the first and best impulse, offers it to Fisher.
