FOREIGN.

Wales Suffering—Some Mystery About It—Prince Arthur to Marry Soon—Origin of the Salonica Outrage—German Squadron Gone East—Almost a Panic in London Financial Circles.

LONDON, May 27.—A court circular announces that the Prince of Wales is suffering from inflammation of the veins of the leg, and will be compelled to keep in the house for some days.

The Dewager Duchess of Cornwall, is dead. The correspondent of the Manchester Guardian says that Prince Arthur, Duke of Connaught, will shortly marry one of the daughters of the ex-King of Hanover.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 27.—Official inquiry into the origin of the Salonica outrage, shows that the American Consul was absent when the Bulgarian girl arrived, and his brother sheltered her one night. The investigation is still progressing.

GIBRALTAR, May 27.—A German squadron of four men-of-war, passed here Thursday night, going eastward. The afternoon's Globe, in its financial article, says: "The condition of affairs on the Stock Exchange is little better than a state of panic."

WASHINGTON.

Redeemed Notes Circulating—A Billous Letter for Blaine's Prospects.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 27.—A World special says testimony is about being taken showing conclusively that redeemed treasury notes which were ordered to be burned, are circulating.

The New York Sun publishes a letter dated Augusta, Me., November 25, 1870, from Jas G Blaine to Warren Fisher, of Boston, offering for \$25,000 to procure Fisher one one hundred and ninety-second part of the entire franchise of the Northern Pacific Railroad, including land and company's stock. After a description of the prospective profits of the transaction, Blaine says he cannot avail himself of the opportunity, and following the first and best impulse, offers it to Fisher. In the concluding paragraph, Blaine says: "Keep my name quiet. Mention it to no one unless to Mr. Caldwell." The Sun also publishes Blaine's receipt to Fisher for \$25,000, and the agreement to deliver as above. Failing to deliver after more than a year, Aquil A Adams, one of the pool for which Fisher acted, reclaimed from Blaine \$5,000—his interest—and obtained it. The correspondence seems to have been furnished the Sun by Adams, a letter from whom is also published.

NEW YORK.

Cooper and Booth Endorsed—Arrested for Smuggling.

NEW YORK, May 27.—The Independent Reform Party met at Masonic Hall to-day, and endorsed the nominations of Cooper and Booth.

Hermann Hirsch, of the defunct firm of Hermann Hirsch & Co., was arrested to-day for smuggling a large amount of laces and corsets in '74. Bail \$1,500.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, May 27. During Sunday in the South Atlantic States, falling and stationary barometer, easterly to southerly winds, slightly warmer, partly cloudy weather and local thunder storms will prevail.

NEW YORK.

Attempts at Murder and Suicide—Proceedings of the Presbyterians.

NEW YORK, May 27.—James Dodwood was found to-day with his throat cut and his wife's head split with a hatchet. He attempted to murder her and suicide. Both were fatally hurt.

In the Presbyterian Assembly, Rev Dr Morris read the report of the delegation of the London Conference of '75, composed of delegates from nearly every part of the world. A resolution for the appointment of a special committee, composed of the moderator, the stated and permanent clerks, the Rev Dr Crosby, the Rev Dr Prime, and the Rev Dr McCoach, who should choose the delegates to represent this General Assembly in the alliance question regarding Catholic baptism, after debate was referred to a committee of five, to report at the next conference.

WASHINGTON.

Grant in Baltimore—Adams Innocent—The Senate on the Impeachment—House Proceedings—Committee Doings, &c.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 27.—The President has gone to Baltimore. The evidence in the investigation of clerk Adams selling offices, shows nothing.

SENATE.—The entire day was occupied in the discussion of the impeachment jurisdiction. Adjourned.

HOUSE.—The Committee on Printing reported a bill to reduce the expenses of advertising in the District of Columbia; passed. The consideration of the bill to promote the efficiency and provide for the gradual reduction of the army was gone into. It reduces the cavalry to eight and the infantry to twenty regiments, and abolishes colored regiments. It merges the quarter master and subsistence departments into one organization, to be known as the department of supplies. No quorum on the preliminary vote, the Republicans abstaining. Various propositions to secure debate were rejected, and filibustering followed until adjournment.

The Senate Appropriations Committee have made over a thousand amendments in the Legislative, Judicial and Executive Appropriations Bill.

The Committee to investigate the newspaper statement that Adams, Clerk of the House sold offices, was discharged.

The Senate, in court, resolved, 23 to 21, to vote on the question of jurisdiction, Monday.

GEORGIA.

The Presbyterians—Delegates to the Pan Council—Fraternal Expressions.

SAVANNAH, May 27.—The General Assembly closed its session to-day. The following delegates nominated by special committee, were unanimously elected to the Pan Presbyterian Council at Edinburgh, in 1877: Alabama—Rev G H Webb, D D, Hon W P Webb; Arkansas—Rev T R Welsh, D D, John R Hampton; Georgia—Rev Donald Frasier, Gen A J Hassell; Kentucky—Rev Stuart Robinson, D D, James A Mitchell; Memphis—Rev J H Rice, D D, Col J W Clapp; Mississippi—Rev B M Palmer, D D, W R Lyman; Missouri—Rev R G Brank, D D, John Phillips; Nashville—Rev John H Bryson, Dr D C Gordon; North Carolina—Rev Jos R Wilson, D D, Judge David Schenck; South Carolina—Rev J B Adger, D D, J A Smythe; Texas—Rev John W Neil, James Sawley; Virginia—Rev Moses D Hoge, D D, Col J T L Preston; At Large—Judge Robt Ould, Rev R M Smith, D D, Rev Allen Wright, Judge B M Eatis. The Committee to whom was referred the resolutions from the Northern Assembly in regard to fraternal relation, reported the following, which was unanimously adopted and telegraphed to Brooklyn:

"We already most cordially enter on fraternal relations with your body, on any terms honorable to both parties, and then as an explanation of what taken in the answer to the overture from the St. Louis Presbytery, which is: 'Resolved, That the action of the Baltimore Conference approved by the Assembly at St. Louis, explains with sufficient clearness the position of our church, but inasmuch as it is represented by the overture that misapprehension exists in the minds of some of our people as to the spirit of this action, in order to show our disposition to remove on our part, all real or seeming hindrances to friendly feeling, the Assembly, explicitly declares that while condemning certain acts of deliverance of the Northern General Assembly, no acts or deliverance of the Southern General Assembly are to be construed or admitted as impugning in any way the christian character of the Northern General Assembly, or of the historic bodies of which it is the successor.'"

The Assembly selected New Orleans as the place of the next meeting, on the third Thursday in May. The Assembly is in session to-night to await any message from the Northern Assembly. Adjourned to-night. Many members have already left.

LOUISIANA.

A Judge Ejected from Court.

NEW ORLEANS, May 27.—Kellogg appointed Judge, Campbell Judge of the Superior Court, who, with a squad of Metropolitan police, took possession of the court room. Judge Lynch arriving, ordered the Sheriff to put him in possession. The Sheriff obeyed, and Campbell will appeal to the courts.

FLASHES.

NASHVILLE, May 27.—Burwell Shin, colored, was hung at Lebanon to-day. He murdered Robert Hamilton, a year ago.

COPENHAGEN, May 27.—The Crown Prince of Denmark is sick. It is feared he and the King of Greece contracted fever at Rome.

CINCINNATI, May 27.—The residence of Col. J W Branch, was robbed of three thousand dollars in bonds, by a man who called the Colonel's daughter to the door and threw snuff in her eyes.

St. Louis, May 27.—The verdicts, yesterday, in the civil suits with the liquor distillers, involved an aggregate of a half million.

CINCINNATI, May 27.—Melodion Hall, with Dubufe's photograph gallery was burned to-day. A painting valued at \$100,000, was insured. There are \$20,000 of other losses. On the building, about \$10,000.

LINCOLN, NEB., May 27.—A company here a month ago, known as Col Storris' squad, has been attacked by Indians. 11 of the 22 composing the party were killed. The sons of wealthy Cincinnati are among them.

A London journal remarks: "When fruit does harm, it is because it is eaten in improper quantities, or before it is ripened and fit for the human stomach. A distinguished physician has said that if his patients would make practice of eating a couple of good oranges before breakfast, from February till June, his practice would be gone. The principal evil is that we do not eat enough of fruit: that we injure its finer qualities with sugar; that we drown them with cream. We need the medical action of the pure fruit acids in our system, and their cooling corrective influence."

Every day brings news of fighting and bloodshed in the Black Hills. The disturbances are becoming more serious than was anticipated. Forty thousand Sioux fighting to protect their country from the invasion of the whites and wreaking Indian's vengeance upon the gold-hunters is a matter of grave import. These wild men, insulted, abused and pursued by the whites, will one day turn upon them and Sioux for their hair in a way that will have an elevating effect.

The Buckeye statesman let him talk on, and when he got through, replied: "Oh, I'm not in any particular need of sympathy, Sam; but I was just thinking what a good thing it might have been for me if all my uncles were aunts."—Brooklyn Argus.
