FOREIGN

The Porte Won't Agree—The Feeling on the London Exchange. LONDON, May 29.—Lloyd commenced taking war risks Friday. BERLIN, May 29.—The Porte has indirectly notified the powers that he will on no account consent to a two months armistice. SERBIA was ready for action, with a hundred thousand infantry, ten thousand cavalry, and three hundred pieces of artillery. LONDON, May 29.—The Stock Exchange opened strong at a sharp recovery for all government stocks, but quickly relaxed to a point in some cases considerably below that of Saturday's closing prices. Business is dull in consequence of making up accounts preparatory to settlement, and because of the absence of the Jewish members, who are observing to-day as a holiday. There has been a heavy fall in most stocks since last account. The statement is to be awaited with some apprehension. Already to-day one firm of brokers have suspended, with liabilities believed to be rather heavy.

CRIME AND CASUALTY.

Murder in St. Louis—And One at the Hot Springs—An Editor Killed by a Train.

ST. LOUIS, May 29.—White Carrol, a steamboat man, was fatally stabbed to-day, in a quarrel with Robert Williamson, proprietor of a furnishing store, under the St. James Hotel. Williamson used a knife after receiving a blow with a cane.

MEMPHIS, May 29.—Passengers from Hot Springs, Ark., report excitement there, Saturday, over the shooting of Jao C Hale, a prominent citizen of that place, and son-in-law of Ex-Gov. Brownlow, of this State, on last Saturday, by Wm P Walsh, the post master and a prominent politician. The difficulty grew out of Walsh building a store on ground claimed by Hale. Reports are conflicting as to who fired the first shot. Walsh emptied the contents of a double-barrelled shot gun into Hale's side, inflicting a mortal wound. Walsh was arrested.

CINCINNATI, May 29.—Mr Bloss, an editor of the Enquirer, was struck by an engine to-day, and killed. He had been 22 years on the Enquirer. He was aged 50.

WASHINGTON.

Apprehensions for the Black Hill Miners—The Sugar and Rice Men from the South—The Tariff Bill on Its Passage.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 29.—There are apprehensions here at the manner in which the Government is prosecuting the Indian campaign. The troops will drive the Indians on the Black Hill mines, insuring their destruction, and leave the frontier towns exposed to raids. The expeditions also leave the telegraphs and railroads unprotected. Great apprehension is felt for the safety of the town of Bismarck. The rice merchants interested from South Carolina, and the sugar and rice men from Louisiana are very ably represented. The delegations are working effectually; and there is some hope that the Hawaiian Treaty will fail in the Senate. There does not seem to be much foundation in the report that California had spent \$300,000 in securing the treaty's passage, through the House.

The Committee on Rules have agreed to allow the Banking and Currency Committee to report at any time. This will allow the \$10,000,000 silver bill for a like amount of legal tenders to come up.

The House resolution that in its sense House legislation affecting the tariff is inapplicable, was put upon its passage, seconded, and the main question ordered, when Mr. Morrison moved a reconsideration of the vote, which is pending. The resolutions are that the vote on the passage of the resolution will not be allowed.

Messrs. Gibson & Potts and Gov. Antoine have arrived, and are at the Senate.

PHILADELPHIA, May 29.—Wm Hartman, the leader of the Young Men's choir Society, is dead, aged 47.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., May 29.—Freeman's livery stable, with 60 horses, was burned to-day. Loss \$70,000.

NEW YORK, May 29.—Baron De Palmburg was buried according to the heathen rites. He will be cremated when permission is obtained.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON.

A Cock and Bull Story About Brining Speaker Kerr—The Speaker's Denial in Toto—The Senate Takes Jurisdiction in the Belknap Case—The Tariff Goes Over, &c.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 29.—Hearney, who had charge of the floor in the House during two terms of the Congress of '65, testifies that he has been continuously in office since '68 in several positions, for which he had the lobby to recommend him for his honesty; that his friend Green came to him after a commission he had given Mr Kerr. He left his door to tell Mr Kerr, about it. Mr Kerr invited him to his room. He called; told Mr Kerr he was a Republican, and Mr Kerr told witness it would be necessary to have some credentials from New York Democrats, and that if it was worth anything it was worth \$300. Subsequently witness and Green called on Kerr, and subsequently witness called at Kerr's house with the credentials, and subsequently handed Mr Kerr at his door in the House of Representatives, \$500, and in two days the nomination was made and in due time Green received his commission and was subsequently cashiered. This story is adhered to with exact particularity. Green could only raise \$400, and witness supplied the \$100. The cross-examination does not shake these leading statements. Witness had no communication with Mr Kerr before or after this affair; had never done or attempted anything like it before or since. Did not know where he boarded or with whom he associated during his two years in Washington. Beyond the main incidents of the bribery, the witness has no positive recollection. Witness first declined to testify, and the committee seemed disposed to give him time to consider when witness wished the examination to proceed. Witness asked Mr Kerr if he desired to tell all he knew. Mr. Kerr replied: "yes."

HOUSE.—The vote to reconsider prevailed, 119 to 95, when Mr Morrison, arising to speak, the matter went over until next Monday.

The House went into Committee of the Whole and adjourned on Wednesday.

The Senate went immediately into secret session which continues.

Speaker Kerr said he did not want to retire without saying a few words, and asked to be sworn. He then testified:

"I only want to remark to-day that as to every material statement made this witness, affecting my personal honor and official integrity, I deny it. That is all. If I were in sufficient health, I would make a statement of the circumstances which led to this investigation in connection with the anonymous letter I received; but I do not feel able to do so to-day. I will further say that conscientiously, I never knew this witness in my life; but I do not say or wish to be understood as saying, that he did not introduce Green to me. I do not know six doorkeepers about this House now, though they are supposed to be my political friends. I never consciously exchanged one-minute's conversation, between Henyon and earth, with that person. I never knew him and he was never at my room he has stated, and of course I never received any money from him nor any from any one else."

NEW YORK.

Unfounded Report—Vanderbilt Low—Good Presbyterian Feeling Looking to a Reconciliation.

NEW YORK, May 29.—The reported retirement of Mr. Orton, and the succession of A B Cornell, to the Presidency of the Western Union, is unfounded. Commodore Vanderbilt is conscientious, but very low. Members of his family are not permitted to see him.

In the Presbyterian Assembly, Rev. Dr. Prime, made the report from the Committee on Correspondence. He said that the South wind blows pleasantly this morning, and that the overture to the Southern Assembly adopted by this assembly on Friday, had been received by the members of the former body in the spirits of gentlemen and christians. [Applause.] Mr. Prime then read the answer of the Southern Assembly. He then continued his report as follows:

"The overture of this Assembly having been received by the General Assembly in the South with such a cordial expression of gratification, the committee recommend that the same resolution, declarative of the spirit in which this action is taken, be adopted by this Assembly; namely: In order to show our disposition to remove on our part all real or seeming hindrance to friendly feeling, the Assembly do hereby declare that while condemning certain acts and deliverances of the Southern General Assembly, no acts or deliverances of the Northern General Assembly or of the historical bodies of which the present General Assembly is the successor, are to be construed or admitted as

impugning in any way the character of the Southern General Assembly.

The reading of this resolution was followed by loud applause. Judge Strong moved the adoption of this resolution, which he believed would aid in the restoration of the fraternal relations between the two assemblies. All, he said, could meet on this common platform, without calling back anything which could not conscientiously be retracted. He hoped that the resolution would be passed by an unanimous standing vote. The Rev. Drs. Fowler and Musgrove spoke in favor of the motion, which was then unanimously adopted in the manner suggested by Judge Strong. The result was followed by three rounds of applause. On motion of Dr. Prime, the whole Assembly then rose and sang the doxology.

THE BLACK HILLS.

300 Whites Killed Since January 1st—Indians Hostile and Troublesome.

NEW YORK, May 29.—A dispatch from Fort Fetterman, says a letter from the Black Hills reports helping to bury seventy-three, and thinks three hundred have been killed since the first of January, by the Indians. The people at Custer City are in constant terror.

OMAHA, May 29.—Capt. Nickerson, Gen. Cooke's aid, telegraphs from Fort Fetterman that all the young warriors from the Red Cloud Agency have gone Northward to join Sitting Bull. The indications are that Cooke will have to contend with the whole force. Cooke's command left Fetterman this morning.
