TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Noon Dispatches.

FOREIGN.

The Sultan of Turkey Dethroned and the Heir Presumptive Enthroned—Rocheport Ill—Financial Feeling Better in London and Paris.
WASHINGTON, D. C., May 30.—The Turkish Minister has received the following telegram from Grand Vizier: "In the presence of the unanimous will of all the people, Abdulaziz Khan, has been dethroned to-day and his majesty Sultan Munad, heir presumptive to the imperial throne, has been proclaimed Emperor of Turkey."
PARIS, May 30.—Henri Rocheport is seriously ill, of dropsy of the heart.
LONDON, May 30.—The Reuter telegraph company have received the following dispatch confirming the report telegraphed from Berlin of the Sultan's dethronement:
"CONSTANTINOPLE, May 30.—It is officially announced here that at the unanimous wish of the people, Abdulaziz has been dethroned and his heir presumptive Munad Elendi, proclaimed Sultan."

At the Exchange to-day, stocks opened strong except Egyptian, which fell heavily during the forenoon, owing to unfavorable rumors from Paris; but afterward recovered and are now 3 to 4 higher than yesterday's closing prices. Turkish securities of all descriptions have been very strong and active, and at one time were 3 to 5 higher. They are now about higher all around. It seems to be the opinion that the overthrow of the Sultan will result beneficially.
PARIS, May 30.—The market here is also very firm.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Summoned to Washington—More Evidence Against Blaine.
BOSTON, May 30.—Warren Fisher, Jr., the contractor for the building of the Fort Smith and Little Rock Railroad, has been summoned to Washington.
The Boston Herald publishes an interview with a prominent lawyer who acted for the creditors of Warren Fisher, Jr., in their investigation of what became of the million dollars in bonds and securities said to have been given Fisher. The attorney says that Fisher testified that he had paid to Hon J G Blaine \$130,000, for no consideration whatever; that Caldwell, who acted as his agent in negotiating the securities, issued a great portion of them in advancing his own enterprises.

NEW YORK.

Bliss on the Stand—He Gives Harvey a Good Character—Vanderbilt Worse.
NEW YORK, May 30.—District Attorney Bliss is on the stand in the Davenport investigation. Bliss stated that he supposed he was mainly responsible for Harvey's appearance in Washington as a witness. He had known the facts in possession of Harvey for two months. He had communicated them to Mr. Bass, a member of the committee. Harvey was appraiser and Darling's right hand man, when Mr. Darling's connection with the Third Avenue Savings Bank was under investigation, and effort was made to stop the investigation by threats that if Harvey's connection with the affairs of the bank was exposed, he would make some damaging revelations about Mr. Kerr. Mr. Bliss said Mr. Bass told him he would not present any charges against Mr. Kerr unless they seemed to be well founded, and that he (Bliss) had carefully questioned Harvey in regard to his relations with Mr. Kerr. He was satisfied that Harvey was truthful and honest.
Vanderbilt was worse last night. His death is looked upon as near.

THE WEST.

More Distressing Reports from the Black Hills.
WASHINGTON, May 30.—Reports from the Far West, say that the Indians attacked Custer City on the 19th, and burned the ammunition house in the centre of the town. The explosion destroyed several houses. The person bringing the information to Omaha, left Custer City at daylight on the 20th. Captain Eagan had returned to Fort Laramie from his scout, and found six hundred Indians attacking an ox train, and drove them northward. The details of the outrages are horrible.

WASHINGTON.

The Southern Rice and Sugar Committees to be Heard To-Day.
WASHINGTON, D. C., May 30.—The Foreign Committee of the Senate will hear to-morrow the combined delegations from New Orleans, Charleston and Savannah, in opposition to the Hawaiian treaty, which admits rice and sugar free, from the Sandwich Islands.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, May 30.

For the South Atlantic and East Gulf States, rising to stationary barometer, generally cooler northeast to southeast winds, and partly cloudy weather and occasional rains will prevail.

WASHINGTON.

Decoration Day Observances—The Cabinet Changes to Take Place To-morrow—Probable Postponement of the Impeachment.

WASHINGTON, May 30.—Decoration Day was celebrated with the usual formality, but it was comparatively tame. All Government business was suspended. The weather was delightful. Dispatches from Northern cities indicate the usual efforts at display.
The Supreme Council of the thirty-third degree convened to-day.
The Cabinet changes take place the first of June, when Cameron will arrive. Pierpont leaves for England June 23d.

It is thought that the impeachment trial will be postponed until November, when the Senate will re-assemble for the purpose. Belknap has a large number of witnesses, and his counsel will defend him at every step. The trial will occupy six weeks or two months. Manager Lord thinks it will require at least six weeks, and extend the session to the first of September. Very eminent legal authorities, who have no connection with the case, assert that the twenty-nine Senators who voted against taking jurisdiction, will not be precluded from voting not guilty on this jurisdictional ground when the final issue is presented.

FOREIGN.

Gold Canada—A Woman Jailed—No Hope for Rocheport—Protestant School Closed in Spain—Peace in Constantinople—Destructive Fire in Quebec, &c., &c.

MONTREAL, May 30.—There were sharp frost and ice in exposed places this morning.

LONDON, May 30.—Mrs. Lina Murry, sister of the Tichborne claimant and one of the witnesses against him, has been sentenced to 7 years' penal servitude for stealing.

PARIS, May 30.—The physicians give no hopes of Rocheport.

MADRID, May 30.—A Protestant School, in the province of Penedra, has been closed by the order of the Minister Junta.

RAGUSA, May 30.—Monkhtar Pasha is making another attempt to relieve Nacic.

PARIS, May 30.—The insurgents have burned Bikacs, Bosnia, and killed 350 Turks.

LONDON, May 30.—A private telegram from Constantinople says the revolution was effected without disturbance of the public tranquility.

QUEBEC, May 30.—Fifty houses were burned on Scott street, and the fire is still raging. High winds prevail.

LATER.—The fire continues to rage with unabated fury. Already the houses destroyed may be counted by the hundreds. Almost the whole population of the lower part of the St. Louis suburbs are moving, and hundreds of poor unfortunate sufferers will be compelled to pass the night in the open fields. Thousands of people are on the streets viewing the fire. The water was turned off from the ward when the fire started, which will account for its rapid spread. The Asylum of the Good Shepherd is now out of danger.

NORTH CAROLINA.

Decoration Day in Wilmington—Morton Not Present—His Address Read.

WILMINGTON, May 30.—Federal Memorial Day; three thousand were in the procession, and a great number of organizations and banners. Gov. Brogden was on the stand. The address prepared by Senator Morton was read by a friend, the Senator being detained at Washington.

NEW YORK.

Sabbath Recommended Instead of Sunday—Flag Presentation.

NEW YORK, May 30.—In the Presbyterian Assembly, a resolution was adopted recommending the use of the word Sabbath instead of Sunday. The Assembly adjourns sine die to-morrow.

ALBANY, May 30.—The banner prepared by the ladies of Albany and other parts of the State, to be presented to the Women's Pavilion at the Centennial Exhibition, was this evening presented by ex-Gov. Seymour, on the part of the ladies, to ex-Gov. Hoffman who received it in behalf of the Women's Pavilion Exhibition. It is of blue silk, richly embroidered, and measures 12 by 18 feet. It is inscribed with these words, worked in letters of gold: "From the daughters of New York to their sisters of the Union."

Beneath the dates: "1776" and "1876" are the words: "The Lord God be with us as he was with our fathers." An ode written for the occasion, by William Cullen Bryant, was read by Hon. Lyman Tremaine.

FLASHES.

PHILADELPHIA, May 30.—This is Decoration Day. There was an improved attendance at the Centennial—over 40,000 visitors. There has been no such crowd since the opening day.

ST. LOUIS, May 30.—The merchantile co-operative concern was burned to-day. Loss \$25,000.

SALT LAKE, May 30.—A party of Mormons, emigrating to Colorado were set upon at the crossing of Colorado River, and Bishop Roundy and another Mormon drowned.

RUTLAND, Vt., May 30.—Sixteen leading insurance companies, after three months' investigation, have decided that A C Bates, a prominent citizen, burned his hotel. They refuse to pay his losses.
