CONVENTIONS.

Democratic Platform of Missouri and Tennessee—Both These States Send Hendricks Delegates—Germans Forming a New Party—Virginia Adopts No Resolutions.

St. Louis, June 1.—A special dispatch to the Republican from Jefferson City, gives the following as reliable: The canvass of delegates for President shows Hendricks 19, Tilden 10, doubtful 1.

JEFFERSON CITY, June 1.—The platform adopted at the Democratic Convention, includes the following: Free schools exempt from all sectarian control, free press, accountable for abuses to the civil and criminal law, preservation of public faith and credit and honest payment of public debt; that we are in favor of a repeal of the resumption act of January 1875, but inasmuch as the National Convention of the Democratic party is to be held within the next 30 days, we deem it inexpedient to adopt any resolutions respecting the currency or finance of the country, but refer the same to such Convention, hereby pledging ourselves to support its platform, and to give the electoral ticket of Missouri for it. A resolution instructing the delegates to labor and vote for Hendricks in National Convention, for President, was offered, but the convention refused to allow it to be read. Great confusion prevailed, but order was finally restored and the Convention quietly Adjourned.

NASHVILLE, June 1.—The platform is for an unconditional repeal, and the substitution of Treasury for National bank notes; no curtailment of circulation, delegation to vote as a unit for Hendricks, who combines the most elements of success. The delegation is nearly all Hendricks men.

St. Paul, June 1.—The North American Turner's band held its annual session at New Ulm centre, a large German settlement, to-day. Resolutions were passed for the formation of a new political party, on a platform of radical reform in the civil service, the return to a specie basis, practical separation of Church and State, and the exclusion of sectarian instruction from the public schools.

RICHMOND, June 1.—The Convention adopted no resolutions. A series was offered but laid on the table.

WASHINGTON.

Evidence Fastened Upon Blaine—A appalling Scene in the Committee Room—Blaine's Appearance—Senate Proceedings.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 1.—Mulligan desired to make a statement when he arrived here. A note came from Blaine, requesting witness and Mr. Fisher to call at Blaine's house. Witness declined but Fisher went. Blaine called at Mulligan's hotel, and last night Blaine called on witness again. Fisher and Atkins were present. Blaine asked regarding private letters which Mulligan had promised to hand back, which he did. Blaine afterwards came to witness' room, where they were alone, plead for the letters and talked of ruining his family and of suicide. He asked to read the letters again, and witness handed them to him, when Blaine gave him back one and retained and has yet some seven-teen letters. After this Blaine spoke of other matters, asking witness how he would like to run a committee or how a foreign consul would suit him? Blaine made a statement: he has the letters, but the conversation about suicide and consulship is all imagination. Blaine says he consulted two friends and to-day will consult two of the best lawyers whether anything in the letters refer to the matters under investigation, namely, the \$40,000 bonds which Scott sold to the Union Union Pacific.

The effect in the committee room was appalling. Mr. Blaine employed himself in folding an envelope very squarely, and in tearing it. In the Senate most of the morning hour was occupied in reports from committees and pension and claims, or bills of a private nature.

NEW YORK.

Nothing Against O'Connor—The Mustang Race.

NEW YORK, June 1.—The Committee on Chas. O'Connor's connection, with the excessive charges in the Forest divorce case, reported no ground for any of the accusations.

Jarrett & Palmer's express train, hence to San Francisco, in 84 hours, departed at 1 o'clock this morning with music, fireworks and cheers. It will arrive at San Francisco, Sunday. FOREIGN.

Curious Rumors About the Deposed Sultan.

VIENNA, June 1.—It is rumored that the deposed Sultan died of apoplexy. Other dispatches in cipher from Constantinople, say it is rumored that he was strangled.

LONDON, June 1.—Latest Constantinople advices indicate the deposed Sultan in close confinement. A hundred thousand dollars worth of treasures on his person, have been seized. He will be sent to a distant town in Asia, where he will be confined with his family.

PENNSYLVANIA.

Grand Procession of Knight Templars.

PHILADELPHIA, June 1.—Upwards of 10,000 Knights Templar, many of them mounted, paraded this morning. Such a demonstration never took place in this city before, in the presence of so many people, and the buildings, public and private, being literally hidden in bunting and festive offerings, added much to the attractiveness of the parade.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, June 1.

WASHINGTON.

Cabinet Members Qualify—Mulligan's Testimony—Congressional Proceedings, &c.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 1.—Cameron was qualified to-day as Secretary of War, and Taft as Attorney General.

The body found in the river at Jersey City, is not that of ex-Commissioner Burdett, who is still missing. Mulligan testified that Blaine got \$30,000 in land bonds, and \$32,500 in first mortgage bonds. The Maine man who bought the bonds paid the money to witness. The bonds were sent by express to Maine parties. Witness gave \$40,000 in bonds to Blaine, and paid the rest. The most of the Maine parties paid five thousand cash and got fifteen thousand in bonds. The details of the Mulligan statements authenticate the report telegraphed at noon.

SENATE.—A communication was read from the Secretary of War closing with the opinion that it will be well to allow the Signal Bureau to remain under control of the War Department. The bill to amend sections 533, 550 and 572 of the revised statutes, in regard to the judicial districts in Arkansas, Mississippi, South Carolina and West Virginia, passed. The impeachment was announced. The judgment of the Senate was made overruling the plea of the defendant as to jurisdiction. An order was submitted, that the accused be ordered to plead further or answer the articles within ten days. Carpenter asked for more time, and finally the court adjourned to Monday. Adjourned.

Confirmations: Fulton, Collector of Customs at Philadelphia; Beal, Minister to Austria; Galevan, Post Master at Brownsville, Texas.

HOUSE.—The army bill was resumed. The bill passed 88 to 114. Its features are known. It passed without amendment. The House proceeded to consider the bill to amend the title of the revised statutes relating to merchant seamen. It provides for the appointment by the Secretary of the Treasury of a commissioner to be known as a shipping commissioner for every part of entry which is also a part of ocean navigation; passed. Elias, of Louisiana, introduced a bill to authorize the establishment of an ocean mail steamship service between the United States and Brazil, referred. Adjourned.

PENNSYLVANIA.

The Fast Train—Poison in Coffee. PITTSBURG, June 1.—The highest speed of the train to San Francisco, was 64 miles per hour; the lowest 25; average 44. The stop here was for six minutes.

EASTON, June 1.—Martin Larose and another died from coffee whereof nine drank. The presence of the poison in the coffee is unaccountable.

THE BLACK HILLS.

The Massacre of the Cincinnatians.

CINCINNATI, June 1.—A dispatch from Lincoln, Neb., details the massacre of Captain Stone's company of Cincinnatians for the Black Hills. It was passing the Sand Hills, fifty miles from Red Cloud Agency. It was warm and their coats and weapons were in the wagons. The men were straggling behind. The Indians rushed in, cutting them off. The leaders, Captain Stone and James Woods were the first victims killed, and the bearer of the report declares that not one of the forty-nine escaped.
