

Talk of Treating with Troublesome Lo-Bill to Extend Time for Settlement with Railreads-Further Testimony in Blaine's Case-Decoration of Confederate Soldiers' Graves.

WASHINGTON, June 3 .- SENATE .-There were petitions from New Orleans, Louisville and Detroit, in favor of the repeal of the bankrupt act. Several peritions were introduced looking to a commission to the Sioux Indians, with a view of acquiring the Black Hills. One proposition proposes the removal of the Indians to Indian Territory. Finally the bill passed, 30 to 8. It anthorizes the President to appoint a commission of 5 persons to visit the Sioux Indians as soon as possible with a view of negotiating a treaty of agreement with them for the cession to the United States of the country known as the Black Hills, and in the interest of peace. It appropriates \$50,000 for the ed that such a Sultan will give no expenses of the Commissioners, to be confirmed by the Senate.
